TAKE SEVEN IN SHERIFF'S RAID

Officers Allege Dinsmore and Companions Were Engaged in Gambling Game.

Dr. A. B. Dinsmore knows how much protection Sheriff J. R. Burns gives to people who desire to operate a game of chance. A short time ago, the sheriff says, the doctor asked him "how about protection" if he decided to open a poker game, and yesterday he learned what the official meant when he assured him that he would get the same protection as everybody else. With seven other men he was arrested in a room beneath the sidewalk at the Club pool room, on First avenue south, and with six of them he was late last night still in the county jail in default of \$500 bail. Evidence that he was engaged in, and perhaps conducting, a poker game was allegedly obtained by Deputy Sheriffs W. C. Bean and E. J. Tait and Constable H. V. Cagle at 3 in the afternoon in the first daylight raid of the year, and consisted of approximately a half bushel of chips, 16 decks of cards and information obtained by the officers at the place where the arrests were made.

The other men arrested were James Caras, a Greek; Harry Tracy, who is believed by the officers to have been run out of Butte last year by Charles Simpson, known also as "Black" and believed to be the "house bull" at the club; Andy Peterson, for the past 30 years known thruout Montana as "the Galloping Swede"; Matt Smith, a Jansen and Taylor Masterston. The chips and cards were scattered over the small room when the officers effected an entrance, evidently having been hastily removed from the table when the alleged players learned a raid was in progress. At the county jail none would admit that a pitch game was being played, but Sheriff Burns and County Attorney H. G. Bennet wonder what sort of a pitch game it was that chips enough to easily fill a half bushel measure were used.

The officers learned that instead of the customary buzzer an electric light was used to warn occupants of the small room beneath the sidewalk of impending trouble, and Deputy Bean stood on guard at the switch, near the entrance of the ground floor, while Tait and Cagle went below. Bean had twice warned the man "Black" away from the button when he obtained evidence that the other officers had arrived at or near their destination, for up from the basement came this command to the apparently sleeping watchman:

"Switch off that light, you idiot; there's a bull down here!"

And a minute later a porter hurled himself up the stairs to remind the brunette that things were getting serious. "For Gawd's sake, give 'em a flash," he shouted, and after that Bean had men to watch away from the switch, and the deputy states that considerable watching was required.

To get into the room where the men and chips and cards were found it was necessary to go thru two doors. The first one was locked and could not be forced, for the reason that it opened outward, was set in a heavy frame and had no knob on the outside. The occupants of the room became suspicious because of the noise that was being made and before Tait could find an ax at the chips were scattered and the men had left the table.

Of the eight men arrested only one was released. This was Taylor Masterston, who told County Attorney Bennet that he was not in the game, but that he had gone to the room to find "a good doctor." Nothing could be learned going to show that he had been playing.

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
