PATERNITY CASE TO BE TRIED MAR. 25

C. F. Schnitzger, the Judith Gap rancher who was arrested at Deer Lodge last month on complaint of Humane Officer A. E. Decew and who is accused of being the father of a child recently born to a 14-year old girl, will be tried at Harlowton March 25, on a charge of statutory rape, according to advices reaching Mr. Decew yesterday. The girl who is being cared for at the Crittenden home, at Helena, will be present at the trial as the state's principal witness, Mr. Decew states. Schnitzger is about 45 years old and is a married man. It is charged that his improprieties extended over a period of several years, during which time the girl lived at his home near Judith Gap.
