SHORTHORN BREEDERS MEET HERE APRIL 24

Will Conduct Annual Spring Sale Which Again Brings Out Need of First-Class Pavilion in This City.

Members of the Montana Short Horn Breeders' association have decided to conduct their second annual spring sale in Great Falls April 24, the place not having been chosen as yet, according to an announcement made yesterday by W. M. Wheeler, secretary-treasurer of the association.

Probably 50 head of pure bred short-horn cattle will be shown on that day. Last year the sale was conducted in connection with the annual gathering of the members of the Stockgrowers' association.

"The fact that Great Falls has again been selected as the city where the sale will be held brings out the fact that a good stock pavilion is needed here," said Mr. Wheeler in speaking of the event.

Mr. Wheeler is backed in this statement by J. A. McCann of Lanark, Mont., who recently stopped in Great Falls en route to Billings where the first sale of pure bred Herefords was held.

He suggests that some of the leading businessmen and members of the commercial club take an interest in the matter and says he believes a good plan would be to have a special space for each pure bred stock breeder in the state and that he believes some of these

growers will even be willing to pay for stalls at their own expense. Such stalls would have the name of the stock raiser, the kind of cattle he specializes in and other data inscribed upon them, thus creating more interest in Great Falls as a livestock clearing center.

Mr. McCann has visited several sales in various states this winter and believes Montana is backward in this particular side of the stock raising business, which he is convinced is one of the greatest, if not the foremost, industries in the state.

POSSIBILITIES OF LIGNITE DEPOSITS TO BE DETERMINED

Bureau of Mines Soon to Begin Experiments in Vicinity of Glendive.

Helena, March 22.—Within the next 30 days the United States bureau of mines will begin experiments in the vicinity of Glendive to determine whether the immense lignite deposits of that region cannot be developed for some commercial use, according to J. J. Ermatinger, secretary of the Glendive Chamber of Commerce, who was here today.

The bureau of mines was induced to investigate the Glendive field through the representations of the Glendive Chamber of Commerce, it is said. The bureau's experts are now working in Texas.

Four Per Cent More to Be Paid by Board on Losses From Hail

Helena, March 22.—E. K. Bowman, chairman of the state board of hail insurance, was authorized by the board today to pay an additional 4 per cent to the farmers of the state who suffered damage in 1918. This will be the last payment on 1918 losses.

The board arranged for the season's business and went over the amendments to the hail insurance laws passed by the last legislature.

Steps were taken to see that all county assessors were furnished with blank applications for hail insurance on their crops, which, under existing statutes, the assessors are required to present to each farmer when they call to assess property.
