POLICE THINK THEY ARE TRIO

Men Taken Sunday Night on Charge of Stealing Booze Said to Be Identified.

Further investigations by the police in connection with the arrest of Charles E. House, Thomas Sturge and Dennis Fay, taken up Sunday night on the suspicion that they were responsible for the theft of a large amount of liquor at Fort Benton March 23, yesterday led to disclosures that Chief of Police Marcus Anderson is capable of associating the men with one of the most daring larcenies to occur in this section in several months. It is believed that they, with one other man, drove an automobile and a truck from this city to Fort Benton, entered the basement of John McGrath's former saloon, stole \$2000 worth of high quality whisky, hauled it to Great Falls, stored it in a shack on the west side and later peddled the greater portion of it about the city.

FAWCETT'S RECORD A LENGTHY ONE

That Dudley Fawcett, the man committed to serve 125 days for stealing a quantity of jewelry from the house of Frank McLean last month, has a long record as a petty criminal is the discovery of R. S. Grant, inspector in charge of the local bureau of criminal identification. Between 1907 and 1915 he was, according to the inspector's information, arrested 14 times, and in nearly every instance a conviction is noted. In 1909 he was arrested five times in Seattle and in 1910, he was sentenced to serve 15 months for theft. Fawcett's record was furnished the local bureau by the bureau at Ottawa.
