

WAR IS OVER BUT NEED FOR CASH STILL GREAT

People Should Not Forget Their Duty to Buy Savings Certificates, is the Appeal of County Director H. F. Lee—Cascade Schools Busy.

People of Cascade county should not allow themselves to forget the fact that the federal government needs a vast amount of money to complete the work made necessary by the part the nation took in the world war and that one means of helping to provide that cash is found in the purchase of thrift stamps and war savings certificates, according to H. F. Lee, director of the thrift campaign for Cascade county. The thrift campaign plans are being shaped by Mr. Lee gradually as he finds that there is a healthy interest in buying the certificates and he believes with a little stimulation from time to time that may be afforded by newspaper publicity it will be reasonably easy to raise all the money assigned to the county this year as its thrift allotment.

Mr. Lee is appointing community chairmen for the thrift campaign work and yesterday he announced that H. J. Hughes has accepted the appointment as chairman of the district including the town of Cascade. He said he also had received from W. L. Rutherford, principal of the schools there, a message telling of the organization in the Cascade schools of five war savings societies.

The other towns are lining up their organizations gradually, according to Mr. Lee. "There are a few things that we all must keep in mind," said Mr. Lee yesterday, "and one of the first of these is that while the war is over, so far as the actual fighting is concerned, there is still a gigantic task ahead of us. We can all help complete that work by buying thrift stamps and war savings certificates and do it on a basis that will not embarrass us and will in no sense cause us any inconvenience.

"Let's show the world that we are just as patriotic after the war as during it. It's up to us to furnish the money to bring the boys home. Are you living up to the best Montana traditions? In other words—are you buying war savings stamps and preparing to buy Victory Liberty bonds? You are only asked to lend your money to your country, and that at a good rate of interest, that those who last summer and fall made the greatest of great sacrifices on the fields of France, shall not have died in vain. Will you finish the job? Yes, you answer. Prove it by buying war savings stamps and Victory Liberty bonds. "If you had died in the trenches, been blown to fragments by a shell, died in a shell hole from the loss of blood, wouldn't you wish the fellows at home to finish the job, and bring your comrades home? Let your answer be the purchase of war savings stamps and Victory Liberty bonds.

"Let me call attention to the splendid appeal issued some days ago by Mr. A. R. Rogers, chairman of the loan organization of the Ninth federal reserve district who said:

"America went into war without selfishness and with high purpose. We achieved vastly. Germany, dismayed by our enthusiasm and power, feigned a knockout, took the count, and the United States flag now flies from the strongest Hun fortresses.

"Nevertheless, the heroic job which we entered so fair-heartedly and carried on so efficiently is yet to be finished. So now we, whom prosperity will consider worthy the name of patriotic Americans, must carry on until our debts are paid and the suffering world is rehabilitated.

"Everyone should know the main facts in the case. Everyone of us who can should tell the others those facts and drive home with written and spoken words the arguments that, based upon these facts will prove every individual's present duty to his America.

"Join the government financing crusaders. Use the ammunition we furnish and all the rest that you can secure to overcome the forces of the uniformed and of the slackers. By pulling together we can finish the job and as 1919 crusaders, gain the Holy Land of Prosperous Peace."

DIVORCE DECREES IN THREE CASES
