FIGHTING MEN CAN REGISTER

County Attorney Finds Returned
Uniform Men Qualified to
Vote Monday.

Even tho a returned soldier or sailor did not take advantage of the absent voter's law while he was away, and has not re-registered since his name was stricken from the rolls after November 5, he is entitled to vote at the municipal election next Monday. This is the position of County Attorney G. Bennett, who in an opinion rendered yesterday, finds that the constitution does not permit a voting citizen to lose his civil and political rights while he is in the service of the military.

Mr. Bennett's opinion, which was in the nature of instructions to the county clerk to deliver certificates to soldiers who were registered prior to November 5, reads:

The constitution provides that any man who enters the military or naval service of the United States shall not lose his civil rights during the time he is in the service, and there is no question as to the intent of the legislature on this point. That a man who goes into service and risks his life may be denied his rights, while a man who stays at home and uses every subterfuge to escape service, retains those rights, is a proposition obnoxious and un-American upon its face.

It will, however, be necessary for soldiers referred to in Mr. Bennett's opinion to go to the courthouse before they go to the polls. Their names were removed from the election records following their failure to vote at the general election last November and the purpose of the call at the county clerk's office is to place their names again on the rolls. That they may do this is a privilege that is not, at this time, extended to other unregistered people who desire to participate in the municipal election next Monday. When they have registered, the clerk will give them a certificate, which will guarantee them the rights to vote after it is presented to the election board in the precinct in which they reside. Deputy Clerk A. E. Caulfield explained yesterday that soldiers applying for permission to re-register now should be prepared to show their discharge papers.

TO PROPOSE NEW COUNTY TONIGHT

Meeting Called at Cascade to
Consider Advisability of
Dividing County.

According to advices reaching Great Falls yesterday, a meeting to be held at Cascade for the purpose of launching a campaign for the creation of Dearborn county out of the western portion of this county, has been called for this evening. No information is had as to the exact territory to be included in the proposed new county, but it is understood that the boundaries will closely follow those designated in the Dearborn county bill. This bill was killed in committee, but it is considered that the divisionists have hopes of putting the project thru under the provisions of the elective division law. Small portions of Meagher and Lewis and Clark counties would be embraced in Dearborn if the proposed county should materialize.

As the elective law is construed by those who profess to be familiar with its workings, interesting possibilities confront the divisionists of both the western Cascade and western Fergus county sections, in both of which division plans are now in process of fermentation. The law is defined to mean that any portion of a proposed new county cannot petition to remain in the old county, but that portions of the old county that are contiguous to the one being created can petition into the separated portion. This, it is said, will permit adverse territory to be identified with a division movement for the purpose of defeating it, and it is reported that an attempt to carry out such a maneuver will be made in western Fergus, and perhaps in western Cascade.

STIRRING PROGRAM AT UNITED SING SUNDAY

Dr. Burtis R. MacHatton Will Talk on "Prayer"
and Choir and Solo Numbers Promise
to Be Unusually Good.

There's going to be a grand program at the Community Sing Sunday afternoon at the Palace Theater building, from 3 to 4. With the special numbers to be rendered by the male quartette and the short sermon on "Prayer" by Rev. Burtis R. MacHatton, this program bids fair to be one of the best yet given at the united services. Excellent musical numbers and the "Parable of the Prodigal Son" were features to the public at the services last Sunday, but the program which has been prepared for the services tomorrow afternoon should prove as big a drawing card, if not more so. The music is under the direction of Julius J. Wuerthner, and besides the special numbers by the male quartette and the anthem by the choir, Stephen Gayler will sing "My Task." L. A. Jenkins will render a cornet solo and a violin number will be played as the offertory. The music for tomorrow's services will be especially good.

It has been the wish all along of the promoters of the Community Sing that the true spirit of the Lenten season should prevail thruout the Sunday afternoon meetings. The distinguishing features of that season are the habits of prayer and self-denial. It is therefore quite fitting that one of the talks at the

Sing should deal with the important subject of prayer. Then there are so many confused notions about the true meaning of prayer, and it has been so greatly discredited in the minds of many by its use during the late war that Dr. MacHatton's proposal to discuss the subject ought to meet with the hearty approval of all people who like to do their own thinking in religious matters. Men have felt the absurdity of praying on opposite sides of a battle, or making God a sort of tribal leader in heaven to give victory, as Zeus and Apollo used to do to their favorites. All of these sides of the question will be discussed in a common-sense way at the Community Sing. The sermon will be confined to fifteen minutes.

Special attention is called to the fact that the hour of the Sunday Community Sing services has been changed from 3:30 to 3 and will last for one hour.

A choir rehearsal has been called for this evening at 7:30 in the Y. W. C. A. rooms. Last Great Falls should forget about the Sing a large locomotive bell will ring thruout the city for one hour before the services. The bell was rung last Sunday and proved to be a unique but firm reminder.
