J. Stephens, manager of the Pacific Coast Fire Prevention bureau which includes Montana and Mr. Schively also in the fire prevention work will arrive in Great Falls tomorrow morning for a three days' inspection trip according to word recently received by Fire Chief A. J. Trodick. Mr. Stephens and Mr. Schively are making an inspection and speaking tour of the Pacific states and will spend 10 days in Montana, three of those being spent in Great Falls. Mr. Stephens has been called the "Father of Fire Prevention" and is said to be a very able speaker. Mr. Schively is noted along the Pacific coast for his ability of speaking before children and his power to hold their attention.

Mr. Stephens and Mr. Schively will start their lecture course in this city with an address on Monday afternoon at 4 to the Women's club in the club room of the Y. W. C. A., on Tuesday morning they will address and give a demonstration before the high school students and in the afternoon repeat


