DODGE MANSION NOW NURSES REST HOME.

That the beautiful mansion Greystone at Riverdale-on-the-Hudson, the residence of the late Miss Grace Dodge, founder of the National Young Women's Christian association, should today be a temporary home for nerve-racked Red Cross nurses who served their country in France, comes as a fitting follow-up of the war program which the Y. W. C. A. has put forth abroad for nurses.

The Y. W. C. A. as an organization expects soon to launch a post-war program for nurses in this country which it is probable will include nurses' clubs and recreation halls as well as official welcome to home-coming units of nurses. The famous old residence at Riverdale-on-the-Hudson adjoins the home of Cleveland H. Dodge, brother of the late founder of the association. It has been closed since her death, some years ago, until last fall, when Mr. Dodge conceived the idea of opening it in a manner that he feels would have met with his sister's approval. Today Greystone is called "The Nurses' Rest Home."

Sitting on the highest peak of Riverdale-on-the-Hudson, the mansion's window-eyes command a marvellous view of the Hudson itself and also of the rolling green hills with their ribbon strips of meadow brooks that run away eastward and to the north.

Tennis, golfing, riding and all outdoor sports, as well as music, afford recreation and rest to nurses who have endured the nerve-trying work overseas. There is only one rule and that says that they may not leave the grounds without permission. The reason for this is that those in charge may know where nurses are in case they may be suddenly wanted for important matters such as telegrams from home.

POWELL RECITAL COMES TONIGHT

America's Leading Woman Violinist Will Play at Grand Starting at 8:30.

Maud Powell, America's foremost woman violinist will render a recital at the Grand theater tonight commencing at 8:30. Madam Powell needs no introduction to Great Falls music lovers, as she has played in this city before. This year, as in seasons past, she has been delighting capacity audiences wherever she has played. Seattle again applauded her and Portland musical people thoroughly enjoyed her program in their city, one of the critics having the following to say concerning her appearance there: "Madam Powell, charming, gracious and brilliant as ever, won new laurels at her concert at the Helix last night. Portland long ago opened its heart to Mme. Powell, and her concerts each year are more in the nature of a home-coming, where the artist and her audience are all old friends."

"One of the most interesting numbers of her well chosen program was the 'Sonata in G Major' by John Alden Carpenter. Musicians have too long turned to European composers for their big concert numbers, and the growing popularity of American music by Americans is going to aid greatly in the development of a national school in this country. Mr. Carpenter's composition abounds in musical beauties, and in the skillful hands of the artist won enthusiastic applause from the audience."

"The Scherzo 'To Marguerite' (Grasse) was an enjoyable little offering, in which the violin approaches very closely to the human voice. 'Maynight' (Palmgren-Powell) was an especially lovely bit, seeming fairly to breathe moonlight and the faint scent of jasmine flowers."

"Song of India" (Rimsky-Korsakow) was one of the gems of the evening."


