

# SHIPS SAVED ALLIES WHEN OUTNUMBERED IN ODESSA STREETS

### Taking of Black Sea Port Has Greatly Encouraged Bolsheviki

Geneva, April 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—Some details concerning the evacuation of Odessa by the allies have been received here from Bucharest. These are to the effect that the allied army was overwhelmed by the Ukrainian soviet troops, who outnumbered them six or seven to one.

The allies fought stubbornly in the streets for many hours, but finally retreated to the port, where they were rescued by allied ships. The French troops suffered most.

# Poison Gas a Boon; Will Kill Tree Pests

Paris, April 11.—Poison gas that worked such havoc during the war will be utilized for a very far different and beneficial purpose in the future, it is said in scientific circles. Gabriel Bertrand, of the Pasteur institute, informed the academy of sciences today that he had discovered a method by which such gas might be supplied for destruction of caterpillars and injurious larvae which had worked destruction on tree growths in the country districts during the past few years.

# NEW LABOR PARTY FORMED IN ILLINOIS

### Organization Has Leanings Toward Townley's Non-Partisan League

Springfield, Ill., April 11.—A new state labor party was launched in Illinois today, with delegates present from all parts of the state. It was said that about 2000 delegates were in attendance, including a delegation of women from the women's trade union league of Chicago. Duncan McDonald, president of the Illinois Federation of Labor presided.

The convention will act tomorrow upon a resolution extending thanks to Governor Frazier, of North Dakota, and A. C. Townley, head of the non-partisan league of that state, and the North Dakota legislature for their interest in the new labor party.

The new party will take action during the session on the adoption of a platform embodying the following 14 points: Right to organize; democratic control of industry; eight-hour day and minimum wage; abolishment of unemployment; equal rights for men and women; stop profiteering; abolishment of kaiserism in education; soldier's and sailor's insurance for all workers; war debt and government expenses; public censorship and nationalization of natural resources; free speech, free press, free assembly; labor representation in the government; labor in the peace conference; an end to wars and kings.

# STRIKE AGITATOR THROWN BY UNION

### Attempted to Break It Up During Seattle Labor Troubles, One Charge

Seattle, April 11.—A. E. Miller, member of the Washington legislature and prominent in union activities during Seattle's recent general and shipyard strikes, has been suspended as a member of the American Federation of Labor executive board of the International Union of Steam and Operating Engineers.

William McKenzie, of Portland, vice president of the Engineers' International union, today declared Miller was suspended, principally for two reasons: "First, because he actively advocated the organization of one big industrial union to disrupt his own international union and the American Federation of Labor; and second, because, as business agent of the Seattle Engineers' local, he agitated in favor of the general strike after his own union had voted against such a walkout."

# Four Aldermen Are Elected in Belt City

Carlson was elected from the first ward by a vote of 30 to 15 for his opponent, Seigling. Two aldermen were elected in the second ward, C. H. Dahl being elected by a vote of 27 against 21 for his opponent, Will Brodie. Only 128 ballots were cast in the three wards.

Their bodies were mutilated beyond recognition and thrown into a pond at Wesenberg, in the Esthonian province. The three in that region. The others had not been dragged when this photo was taken. The bolsheviks defended their act by saying it was in retaliation for the murdering of Rosa Luxemburg and Karl Liebknecht.

# RED CROSS WILL FIGHT EPIDEMICS

### Plan is to Co-Operate With Public Health Forces to Keep Out Infected.

The foreign commissions and other organizations of the American Red Cross are to be utilized to aid the United States public health service in preventing the introduction into the United States of epidemic diseases. Close cooperation between the Red Cross, which is frequently called upon to combat contagious diseases in foreign fields, and the public health service will result in more rigorous examination at American ports of immigrants hailing from epidemic zones abroad.

Col. Robert E. Olds, American Red Cross commissioner to Europe, has forwarded from Paris to American Red Cross commissions in various European and Asiatic countries the following instructions: "We are requested by the United States government to make our entire organization available for the vital service of procuring and forwarding promptly from time to time full information concerning the presence of cholera, typhus fever, plague and other grave communicable diseases wherever we may operate."

"The purpose is to enable the public health service to take such measures as may be deemed appropriate to prevent the spread of such diseases to the United States. We are also asked to forward in some way all information available to Red Cross agents as to probable emigration from ports or areas coming under their observation."
