HERE IS SCHEDULE FOR OFFICIAL CLEAN-UP WEEK

Sanitary Commissioner William Shea and Force of Whitewings Prepared to Attack Rubbish in Full Force Early Monday Morning.

GARBAGE WAGON SCHEDULE FOR CLEAN-UP WEEK

First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth alleys will be cleaned Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth alleys will be cleaned Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. The West Side will be cleaned Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Boston Heights and Rolfe Addition will be cleaned Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

If householders take heed and have their garbage ready upon schedule time the work of cleaning the city spick and span next week will be a "clockwork" matter. Sanitary Commissioner William Shea and his force of white wings, horses and wagons, are prepared to do their mightiest to make Great Falls the most sanitary and the cleanest city of its size in the United States and they expect to have accomplished this result by Saturday night of this week, tomorrow witnessing the ushering in of the official annual "clean-up" week.

Mr. Shea announces all people, whether owners or renters, who fail to clean up their premises and have the garbage and rubbish ready for the city teams will be arrested and compelled to clean up at their own expense; and perhaps fined in addition. There will be 12 garbage teams, two hayracks and a truck at work. It will take 40 men to man them and keep the rubbish moving to its fate. The hay-
