COMMUNITY SING THIS AFTERNOON

Mrs. D. G. Black, Grand Opera Singer, to Appear at the Palace Theater.

"I'm going to the Community Sing tomorrow afternoon. Its free and they pass out the words."

The foregoing statement was made by a boy about 9 or 10 at one of the matinees yesterday afternoon. This was all that was said but it shows how the spirit of the Community Sing services has pervaded the city, reaching even to the little boys who are usually not to care for such things. The child's attention was perhaps attracted because they are open to everyone and the admission price is nothing, as only a free will offering to help pay the expenses for the rental of the theater is taken up.

The programs which have been given at the three preceding Sings were especially good but the one to be given this afternoon is perhaps the best that will be given during the series. Today is Palm Sunday and the beginning of Easter week, which all sects and creeds seek to celebrate in some form or manner. Special features of attraction have been added to the program.

Mrs. David G. Black or Mrs. Justine Black, as she is better known on the stage, who arrived in the city yesterday morning from Seattle, will give two selections, one a vocal solo by request and the other a duet sung with her husband. During the season of 1917-18 Mrs. Black did operatic and concert work in New York and the east. She made her debut into the musical world in Italy and for several months sang in the best European operas. Her training has been of the best as her beautiful mezzo-soprano voice easily testifies. She has studied under a large number of music masters in Europe and America. Music lovers of Great Falls will be afforded a rare opportunity to hear grand opera sung by a grand opera singer.

In addition to Mrs. Black's numbers there will be two anthems especially fitted to today's services by the choir.

Rev. Dr. Curtis H. MacHutton will give a short sermon of interest to everyone, no matter of what religion. Dr. MacHutton has appeared on the program each Sunday afternoon giving a short sermon and his numbers have been perhaps the most enjoyable ones of the program. His talk on "Prayer" last Sunday was especially good.

The services will begin promptly at 3 and last for one hour. The Salvation Army, which has done so much for the American boys in Europe will attend the sing in a body, occupying a special place on the stage. Those who wish to get a seat or even standing room at the services this afternoon are urged to come early. A number of demands have been sent in for reserved seats, but it has always been the policy of those in charge of these services that the first come the first served, so no reservations have been made either on the lower floor or in the balcony.

At 2 A. Lynch will drive thruout the main streets of the city ringing a large locomotive bell announcing the hour of service and reminding those who might otherwise forget.


