### Former Great Falls Newswriters to Put Out Unique Publication

Special to The Daily Tribune.  
Butte, April 14.—A weekly periodical  
in newspaper form, undoubtedly more  
unique than any other publication thru-  
out the northwest, will make its appear-  
ance in Butte under date of April 19.  
This new publication will be known as  
the Butte Saturday Pink, and the pub-  
lishers are George Weatherhead, man-  
ager, and Leo P. Reardon, editor. Their  
periodical will be printed on pink paper,  
and will be made up in a typographical  
style all its own.

Not only will the Saturday Pink deal  
with current topics in Butte, but in a  
humorous, entertaining manner the Pink  
so the publishers say, will also treat the  
happenings of all other cities thru-  
out the state. "Fun, fiction and philosophy"  
will be the caption followed in writing  
the paper, which will be liberally illus-  
trated, and it is said that the character  
of the reading matter cannot cause of-  
fense, but will, to the contrary, enter-  
tain readers from all walks of life.

Five thousand copies of the first issue  
will be printed, and will be distributed  
by newsdealers on trains, as well as in  
Butte, Anaconda, Missoula, Bozeman,  
Billings, Helena, Great Falls and Havre.  
As rapidly as possible it is proposed to  
place the Pink on sale in a like manner  
throughout the state generally.

George Weatherhead, the manager,  
has been engaged as a printer and pub-  
lisher for more than 30 years. He came  
to Butte six months ago as a news writer  
in the Butte office of the Anaconda  
Standard from the Great Falls Tribune,  
where he was formerly engaged as a  
news editor. Mr. Reardon, the editor  
of the Pink, also came to Butte from  
the Great Falls Tribune, and for nearly  
a year has been a news writer for the  
Butte Miner.

Both have just resigned their former  
local newspaper positions to become en-  
gaged exclusively in the publication of  
the Saturday Pink.
