

SHEA SUGGESTS ARTISTIC TOUCHES HERE AND THERE

Sanitary Commissioner Says Fastening Screen Windows, Painting Veranda Chairs, Etc., Should Be Included in Cleanup Task.

Not satisfied with supervising the work of 52 whitewings, 16 teams of horses and a huge motor truck, the complement of the army which this week is driving dirt from the city of Great Falls, Sanitary Commissioner William Shea also suggests a few artistic touches here and there to be included in the cleanup week task.

For instance, there are last season's porch chairs. How do they look? Has the bright green or red paint been rubbed from their surface? If so Mr. Shea says a little paint would do no harm and it might as well be done while the remainder of the cleanup work is being carried out.

Then there will be flies to fight a little later. Have you made an effort to protect baby from the disease carrying pests? If not Mr. Shea suggests that the screen doors and windows could be made part of the cleanup week schedule.

Then there are some of the residences within the city limits, according to the commissioner, that have not yet been connected with the city's sewerage system. For the sake of sanity the city urges that these residents if possible install connections at once.

Mr. Shea also states there are a num-

ber of lots raked up this week by the city cleaners that have not been plowed for garden purposes, altho they were last year. A few weeks ago the city council decided not to plow garden lots free of charge this season as the war is now over and it is felt those who want gardens should stand the few dollars necessary to engage a man and team to do the work. However, the city will plow lots for people too poor to have the work done. Mr. Shea thinks probably there are some people not acquainted with this and wishes to bring it to their attention, so there is no reason why everyone with a little patch of ground cannot have a garden should they desire one.

"We are certainly hauling the rubbish away, tons and tons of it," said Mr. Shea. "I have never seen people clean up so eagerly before and the campaign against dirt is progressing nicely. We are now a day behind our schedule, but everything is going right merrily and Great Falls is being given the most thorough cleanup it has ever had."

ENGINEER SUFFERS PAINFUL INJURIES

Great Northern Man Falls From Engine, Dislocating Right Shoulder.

Ed Thielander, engineer for the Great Northern, was the victim of serious injuries yesterday afternoon when he fell from his engine, injuring his right arm and dislocating his right shoulder. Thielander ran out of the city yesterday a little before noon on freight train No. 435. The accident occurred about two miles west of Pover when Mr. Thielander went out on the running board to inspect a gear on the left hand side of the engine. Losing his footing he fell to the ground. He was brot immediately to this city in a special caboose for medical attention and is now a patient at the Columbus hospital.

Mr. Thielander has been with the Great Northern, first firing then running an engine out of this city, for the past 15 years, and is considered one of the best men on the road.

WOULD FORECLOSE LIEN
