**CHINESE HERO BACK WITH 91ST; SEATTLE KIN TO FEAST HIM**

**Wong Wing Is American-Born and Preferred Fighting to Q. M. Corps.**

Seattle, April 16.—Local Chinese circles are rejoicing over word of the safe arrival in New York of Private Wong Wing, of C company, 361st infantry, 91st division, and a nephew of Goon Dip, local Chinese consul. Private Wong Wing is a native American and was one of the first selected for duty under the selective service act. He refused a commission with the quarter-master corps before leaving with the 91st for France, saying he would rather "fight than work." Wong, while a member of C company, saw some of the hardest fighting of the war. A great Chinese feast and reception will be tendered him upon his return to Seattle.

**BOY JOYRIDER IS BACK ON THE JOB**

**His Coaster Wagon Runs Front of Officer's Machine; Home From Hospital.**

Johnny Bernsfield, 7-year-old boy who was injured Saturday night when the coaster wagon on which he was riding was struck by Officer Ike Greer's motorcycle, has returned to his home at 215 Thirtieth street south from the Deaconess hospital and is reported to be entirely recovered. That the boy was not more seriously injured is considered remarkable in view of the circumstances of the accident, which was crossing the intersection at Second avenue north and Fourteenth street after dark and evaded a passing automobile with but a small space to spare, but only to pass immediately in front of the officer's machine. To minimize the inevitable damage to the car, the boy jumped and threw himself from his seat, the motor-cycle skidding into the boy's wagon, tripping it over and throwing the youthful joyrider to the pavement. He was bruised about the body and suffered considerably from the shock, but this he accepted for what was due only to the low rate of speed at which the officer was riding when the collision occurred.

Ethel Warren Thielbar, landlady at the North street hotel, was arrested early in the month for allegedly keeping a disorderly house, was found guilty of the offense of which she was accused in police court yesterday and ordered to pay a fine of \$100. **ALASKA DELEGATE DIES NIGHT BEFORE ELECTION IS CITED**

**Charles A. Sulzer Was Brother of Former N. Y. Governor; Owned Mines.**

Juneau, April 16.—Selection of a successor to Charles A. Sulzer, Alaska territorial delegate to congress, who died suddenly while aboard a launch enroute from the town of Sulzer to Ketchikan for medical treatment, last night, will be made by a special election to be called by Governor Thomas Riggs, Jr. This is in compliance with a territorial law passed in accordance with the organic act of territory, and the governor is required to give at least 30 days' notice of the special election.  
Sulzer was taken ill Monday morning and was being removed to Ketchikan under physicians' orders when he died. By a coincidence, the territorial canvassing board today officially announced Sulzer's election as delegate to congress, as the result of last November's election, at the same time the news of his death was made known.

Both houses of the legislature adjourned in respect and Governor Riggs ordered flags throughout the territory placed at half mast.  
Sulzer, a democrat, was seated in congress as delegate from Alaska early in 1917. He held his post until last fall, when he lost a contest for the seat brot by former Delegate James Wickersham, his republican opponent at the polls. Last November Sulzer and Wickersham were again candidates. Altho the result was close, cables from Juneau recently said the investigating board had decided to award the certificate of election to Sulzer.

Sulzer was a West Point man and served as a volunteer in the Spanish-American war. He was born at Roselle, N. J. He had extensive mining interests at Sulzer, southeastern Alaska, and was a brother of former Governor Sulzer, of New York.

**ULM SCHOOL GETS SUPERIOR PLATE**

**Proved Best Managed and Kept Among 12 Buildings During Recent Contest.**

The Ulm school of District 85, has been awarded the Superior name plate, ranking first of any school in Cascade county and winning this plate with an average of 97 1/2 per cent. To gain one of these plates a school is required to fulfill 15 different points and among them is to be well equipped, maintain a teacher who has at least a first grade certificate, the pupils must attend school regularly and come neatly dressed, must be courteous, obedient and industrious. The playgrounds and the school must be kept neat and orderly as well as the books and desks; in other words any school to be awarded one of these plates must be a model in the community in which it is located.

A few years ago the standard name plates were issued and to obtain these it was necessary for the school to have a rank of 85 per cent. To win the Superior plate the school must have 90 per cent, the Ulm school reaching a mark of 7 1/2 points above the required standing.

For the past few years the school has been under the capable supervision of Mrs. Hallie Kinders and it is largely due to her efforts that it has been awarded the Superior plate. There are 12 children enrolled and 10 of these had perfect attendances for the past month. The children attending this school are: Evelyn Le Febvre, Mable Largent, Ruth Largent, Dorothea Largent, Annie Sisko, Joe Sisko, Fred Jones, Eva Hensley and Kenneth and Walter Hensley.

**205 U-BOATS SUNK SAYS SIMS; CREWS ENDED THEIR LIVES**
