tution of the United States for the American delegates to participate in the execution of a sort of international ex post facto law. At that time, however, it was proposed to charge criminal and military offenses, and it was suggested today that the decision to base the indictment upon violation of international morality and the sanctity of treaties was taken to meet the American viewpoint.

Each of Big Five to Name Judge The announcement issued by the state department follows: "Following are the proposed articles regarding penalties, for insertion in the treaty of peace to be considered at a plenary session of the conference today, Monday, at 3 o'clock p. m., Paris time: "Article 1. The allied and associated powers publicly censure William II, of Hohenzollern, formerly German emperor, not for an offense against criminal law, but for a supreme offense against international morality and the sanctity of treaties.

"A special tribunal will be constituted to try the accused, thereby assuring him the guarantees essential to the right of defense. It will be composed of five judges, one appointed by each of the following five powers: Great Britain, the United States of America, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan. "In its decision the tribunal will be guided by the highest motives of international policy with a view to vindicating the solemn obligations of international undertakings and the validity of international morality. It will be its duty to fix the punishment which it considers should be imposed. "The allied and associated powers

It will be a welcome announcement to all those who are interested in the development of the Sun River irrigation project that a gentleman is to become the project manager who has had wide experience in the operation of irrigated land.

George O. Sanford is now in the city, having come here from the Shoshone project where he has been the project manager for a number of years. He will take charge of the work on the Sun river, both as to construction and operation.

Mr. Sanford will have his office at Fort Shaw, but his family will reside in this city where he has purchased a residence. He has had charge of the Shoshone project where the average annual rainfall is only six inches and has developed a large production in potatoes which were last year shipped from this project to such distant markets as Detroit and Pittsburgh.

He is enthusiastic about the outlook for the Sun river irrigated lands and will proceed upon the well developed theory that the basic products should be alfalfa, cereals and potatoes.

To help out along the potato line of development, Henry Louis, who is at the head of the Louis Distributing company of Powell, Wyo., will come to Great Falls in a few weeks and he will study the situation, looking to a much larger potato production on the Sun River project and the proper marketing of the same.

In order that some of the outstanding requirements on the part of the public looking to the development of the big Sun river enterprise, Mr. Sanford has consented to speak before the Rotary club at the luncheon to be held Wednesday, May 7.
