### Private Lawns, Too, Need Attention, as the Little Pest Is Now in Bloom and Soon the Seed Will Be Scattered—Dig Them Out by Roots.

In addition to the need of Great Falls people exerting efforts to see that the Victory bond subscription is completed at once, there is another thing that must be taken care of and at once, according to property owners who have the best interests of the city at heart. The dandelions need attention. Just now they menace the boulevards and lawns. The property owners who are careless have been letting them grow, and the result has been that there are thousands of them in certain parts of the city and that yards and boulevards are yellow with their bloom. That means that the seed will soon be scattered to the four winds and another crop will be spread, making

The city forces will have to be called into action to rid the boulevards and there are scores of private residences that have a big lot of work about them for the owners as occupants in clearing the lawn of the little pest. ## FRED ARKELL AND MISS PALMER WED

### Well Known People Get Marriage License at Portland, According to Report.

The foregoing dispatch to The Tribune reveals a secret to most of the friends of Fred A. Mr. Arkell had taken a very few of his intimate business friends into his confidence before leaving a few days ago for Portland but the news had not been generally known. Mr. Arkell has not been in business since he sold his interest in the Fashion and stated only recently that he had not fully determined what he would engage in.

The bride for a number of years was employed as a bookkeeper both in the Arkell store and later in the Fashion and she was with the company until the business was sold. It is assumed by friends of the bride and groom here that they will return shortly and make their home in Great Falls where both have many friends.

## NO MORE SPECIAL DAYS FOR FREIGHT

Outgoing freight shipments are now being received by railroads every day pursuant to orders transmitted to traffic departments from the regional director, the new ruling relating particularly to consignments of less than carlots. Heretofore shipments have been received only on "sailing days" which were certain days designated out of each week for the unloading of outgoing freight at the freight house.

The new ruling, it is explained by D. G. Black of the Great Northern's traffic department does not necessarily mean that outgoing freight will reach its destination more promptly than heretofore. It means, instead only that freight going to outside points will be received at any time for shipment on the next train bound for the station to which it is consigned.
