### MARTIN BRAY SEEKS NEW TRIAL TO WARD OFF LIFE SENTENCE

Man Convicted of Murder at Butte Says There Were Flaws in Evidence.

Special to The Daily Tribune. Butte, April 30.—Martin Bray, convicted of the murder of his former wife, Daisy Alton Bray and sentenced by the jury to life imprisonment, is seeking a new trial. His attorney has filed a notice of intention to move for a new trial on the grounds of misconduct of the jury; that the verdict was decided by lots or by means other than a fair expression of opinion on the part of all jurors; misdirection of the jury in matters of law; that the jury separated without leave of the court after retiring to deliberate upon their verdict; that the verdict was contrary to the evidence; and that new evidence has been discovered. Judge J. J. Lynch has made an order

allowing the defendant 90 days in which to prepare and serve a bill of exceptions, and has also ordered that the motion for new trial be postponed until after the bill of exceptions has been settled. Bray comes up Saturday for the passing of the formal sentence of life imprisonment. Owing to professed illness Bray, during his trial, was wheeled in the court room in an invalid chair, a contrivance which he occupied throughout the court proceedings. His defense was that of insanity. He shot his wife last May while she was on the street, with K. S. Showers, while the latter was escorting Mrs. Bray and her children to the theater. Showers was also killed during the shooting. The Brays had been divorced before the double murder.

### CANADIAN VETERAN TO GIVE ADDRESS

### COLLINS SHOWS IN THE SPRINT

Junior at High School Proves He Has Ability in the Dash Races.

Talmadge Collins, junior, won honors yesterday by coming out first in two events in the first day's track meet held on the new running track just south of Central high school. Collins did some good work at the state meet at Missoula last year and is promising to duplicate last year's record by the start made this season. Yesterday's program included the 220-yard dash, the shot put, broad jump, mile run and the low hurdles. Today the high school boys will compete in the discus throw, the 100-yard dash, throwing the javelin, the 440-yard dash and the pole vault. The interclass track meet will end tomorrow with the high jump, the 50-yard dash, high hurdles, 880-yard run and the relay race. The juniors are way ahead in the race for class honor so far, having 27 points. The sophomores are next with 12 points, the seniors having 12 and the freshmen two.

Shot put—Hoag, junior, first; Moriarty, senior, second; and Martin, junior, third. Distance 36.6 feet. Broad jump—Collins, junior, first; Davis, junior, second; Restell, senior, third. Distance 18 feet 7 inches. Mile run—Long, sophomore, first; Graybeal, junior, second; Bryant, freshman, third. Time, 5:8. Low hurdles—Davis, junior, first; Hoffman, sophomore, second; Leverich, third. Time, 27 4-5.
