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AMERICAN IN JAIL FOR SERVING HUNS IS KNOWN IN BUTTE

Henry Bode, Arrested When Recognized by Mrs. Gerard, Formerly Worked in Mines

Helena, May 1.—Henry Bode, also known as Henry Wilson, the only American soldier who is known to have entered the employ of the German government during the war as a spy, is widely known among the older soldiers of Montana and especially to the members of the First Montana regiment, which saw service in the Philippines.

Adjutant-General Phil Greenan was sergeant in a company of the First Montana in which Bode was a private. Bode enlisted in Dillon.

Bode is now serving ten years in the Governor's Island federal prison near New York, following his recognition in New York several weeks ago by Mrs. James W. Gerard, wife of the former ambassador to Germany, and the daughter of the late Marcus Daly of Butte. It was Mrs. Gerard who spotted him and caused his arrest. She had seen him in Berlin.

Records of the First Montana in General Greenan's office, show that Henry Bode was enrolled in the regiment in Dillon on May 2, 1898. He was 22 years old, five feet, four inches tall, fair complexioned, blue eyes and with brown hair.

After serving in the Philippines and being returned to this country where he left his wife, who was Barbara Steuer, of Dayton, Ohio, and went to China. He later joined the Russian service and escaped capture by the Japanese by disguising himself as a woman.

First Forest Fires of the Season Break Out in the Flathead

Special to The Daily Tribune. Kalispell, May 1.—The first forest fires of the season occurred Tuesday, breaking out at three different points in the county and it is believed that all were due to carelessness in brush burning.

The worst one was on the E. W. Doering place near Stoners on the west shore of Flathead Lake. A small brush fire was whipped into a conflagration in a few minutes by a suddenly rising wind, and covered an area of 80 acres before it could be checked.

Small fires broke out at Kila, near the old Enterprise mill, and near the lake at Whitefish, but they were brought under control before any great damage was done.

Butte, May 1.—Silver Bow county has reached its quota of \$3,000,000 for the Victory loan. Banks will receive further subscriptions until May 10. It is expected that a substantial over-subscription will be made. The quota for this county was raised in three days. Lieutenant Governor W. W. McDowell was chairman of the campaign. He was assisted by 212 men and 240 women. This is the fifth time that Silver Bow has gone over in Liberty loans.

Will Eliminate Hairpin Turn in Marshall Grade

Helena, May 1.—Approval by the federal bureau of good roads of the state highway commission's project number 29, to eliminate a hairpin turn on the Marshall grade north of town, has been secured, according to John Eddy, assistant highway engineer of the commission. The work will cost about \$16,000. Mr. Eddy will leave tomorrow for Glasgow to inspect a state aid project, work on which was stopped last fall because of the weather.

It is estimated there will be approximately 1200 or 1300 land owners included in the district. So far, everyone has shown much enthusiasm over the project and there is no doubt but that it will be put across, and the district formed this summer.

Choteau Soldier Who Was Wounded in the Argonne Returns Home

Special to The Daily Tribune. Choteau, May 1.—Chas. Cooper, late of a machinegun company in the 28th division, returned home from overseas this week. He had been hurried into the world series without much of a workout. He left Hoboken on June 28, 1918, and by Aug. 24 he was operating a machinegun in the Argonne Forest. Mr. Cooper was in the thick of the fight for 21 days, four days without food. He was finally stopped Oct. 8 by a wound in the leg and an overdose of German gas. From then on until his return he has been in the hospital.
