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Butte Contributes Heavily to Fund for Freeing of Ireland

Special to The Daily Tribune. Butte, May 12.—Butte has already exceeded its quota in the state campaign to secure \$10,000 with which to aid the cause of Irish independence, according to Judge J. J. Lynch, state chairman of this movement. The crusade will be continued in an endeavor to secure more than \$15,000.

J. J. Harrington, campaign treasurer, has received \$5,750.50 to date. Of this, \$800 was contributed by Deer Lodge citizens and \$250 by residents of Alhambra Springs. Butte and Waverly have contributed the remainder.

"We expect to secure at least \$7,500 in this county," said Judge Lynch. "Anaconda, Helena and other Montana cities will probably subscribe an equal amount and the total fund made available in this state should amount to \$15,000 to \$20,000."

The campaign was not waged during the Liberty drive. Judge Lynch said, but has been resumed.

Montana delegates to the recent national meeting of Friends of Irish Freedom held at Pennsylvania pledged \$10,000 to the cause in the name of this state.

RENEWAL OF ACTIVITY IN MINING FOLLOWS SILVER INFLATION

Increase in Price of Metal Enhances Interest in Old Silver Ore Properties.

Butte, May 12.—A marked renewal of interest in silver properties has become evident since the removal of the government price and the hotel lobbies are beginning to fill with small groups of old-time silver miners who are discussing the situation and preparing to open up many of the properties of the silver sections of the state.

Charles Whitcomb, who with Ben Phillips took a fortune out of the Ruby gulch gold mines of the Little Rockies, has been in Butte during the past week gathering machinery for his new silver mill at the Black Pine tailings. Phillipsburg operators at the Thornton, who include Ralph Blitt of the Bi-Metallis company, say that Phillipsburg interests are signing several deep shafts on silver properties in the Hasmark canyon, one on the True fissure which is already down to the 600-foot point and one on the Algonquin ground.

A group of leasers recently opened up a new silver vein on the Scratch Awi, one car from which returned upward of 200 ounces of silver to the ton. Will McClure recently came over from the Black Pine mine with a fine lot of samples from the bottom of this famous old property which has recently been unwatered and plans are being matured for a flotation plant for it. James Murray has leased the old Montana Ram property lying west of Phillipsburg and given a bond on it at \$40,000.

The new mill at the Comet mine is underway and developments at the Comet, the Baltimore, under lease to Max Atwater and associates the Mount Washington, which is a regular shipper; the Hope lease, now being worked by Gus Freeburg, who has shipped several cars of high-grade gold ore recently; the Coynage, Liverpool and Lump Gulch, the Legal Tender at Clancy and several Elliston properties, all are renewing outside activities in old silver or silver-gold properties.

The camp of Neihart has, during the past year, been put into activity by the operations of the Cascade company, which is working the Moulton and Broadwater mines. During the past week, J. C. E. Barker was in town from Neihart and reports that the Butte men who have taken an option on the Ripple group have made their first payment and are going ahead with their mill and development work. Negotiations are pending on several other Barker holdings around Neihart and an active summer is looked forward to.

Denver people recently arrived in Butte are in Montana to look over the Bloody Dick district west of Armstead. Several new operators in the Salmon river country including a large milling operation which has been recently put into commission by Guy Stapleton and associates, probably will be producing during the next few months.

Recent reports from New York are to the effect that additional funds have been raised for the continuing work on the Great Butte properties north of town, and James Murray is just now starting a new concentrating mill to work the dumps at the Keating mine at Barkerburg.

Marcus Hewett is now in Salt Lake City closing a deal for funds to build a new mill for the Hope mine at Basin and James Breen expects to start his enlarged gold mill at the Porphyry Dyke during the coming summer.

At Pajarito, Glen Anderson is rebuilding the Polaris mill into a cyanide plant and expects to have this old silver property in the ranks of the producers before the spring months are past.

Toulumne people and W. I. Higgins of Deer Lodge have started work on the development of the old Copper Cliff mine near Bonita, which is copper-silver property, and at Argenta in Bosshead county, the Jack Rabbit is making regular shipments, and other old silver producers of that section are taking on activity in several directions.

New Road Being Built in Musselshell County

Special to The Daily Tribune. Roundup, May 12.—Work on the long deferred Goulding Creek road has started and will be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible. This will make available another road to Billings, which while slightly longer will be better improved and will no doubt get the heaviest of the traffic. It will also connect at Ethel with the road to Broadview, giving the farmers living in that section of the country a long needed road. The cost of the first two units will be \$18,000 and the contract has been let to William Walker of this city.

PLANS OUTLINED FOR BABY CLINIC AT CONRAD IN JUNE

Both are natives of France and have just returned from that country. For four years the mother was a German prisoner and suffered many rigors and hardships before being released. As a result of a bad cold contracted on the voyage across, Mrs. Hotel was confined to the hospital for a few days here. The daughter has been an interpreter in the Red Cross service since the war began.

Government to Assist Roundup Street Work

Roundup, May 10.—Notification has been received by City Engineer Fred Quinnell that Roundup's application for federal aid on post roads within the city limits has been approved and the federal engineer will arrive within the next day or two to settle the preliminary details. The proposed improvement will affect three streets and will involve the expenditure of about \$60,000, of which half will be furnished by the federal authorities.


