



Team to Augment Olympic Entrants

Soldiers to Appear in Games in France From June 22 to July 6.

New York, May 15.—Plans are being completed for the formation of a team or army of athletes which will be sent from this country to augment the American entries in the inter-allied games to be held in France June 22 to July 6.

Owing to lack of time it will not be possible to hold tryouts as is customary previous to Olympic games. Instead every army camp student training corps and amateur athletic union has been requested to name one or more eligibles and from this roster a team of at least 50 will be selected.

The team will be in military uniform and under military discipline. The final selection will not be made until shortly before the date of sailing.

HOME SERVICE IS HELPING DAILY

Returning Soldiers Receiving Attention From Red Cross in Many Ways; Families Aided.

One of Cascade county's returned soldiers was taken ill recently at one of the local hotels and when discovered asked someone for the Red Cross. Representatives from the Home Service called upon him and found that he has not been well when he received his discharge and had gone to bed as soon as he arrived in the city.

A physician who was called donated his services and sent the boy at once to one of the local hospitals. As his condition was quite serious he has been put under the care of a special graduate nurse. His parents who are in the extreme east are frequently notified of their son's condition. All of the expenses are to be charged to the government and all the little things which a sick boy away from home needs are being looked after by the Home Service.

Hundreds of such incidents are listed on the calendar of the Home Service section. The enormous increases in their field of activities is well demonstrated by the reports of the past few months. In January 255 families in the county received assistance of some kind. In February the Home Service was able to render aid to 772. The number increased in March to 1190 and at the last of April the records told of 1219 families of soldiers or sailors who were fortunate enough to have received help from the Home Service section.
