## Churchill Downs Horse Race Today

Another Famous Kentucky Event to Be Pulled Off for \$10,000 Purse Money.

Louisville, Ky., May 23.—Nine thoroughbreds, regarded as the best handicap horses ever sent to the barrier on an American race course, are carded to go to the post at Churchill Downs tomorrow afternoon, the seventh Kentucky handicap for three-year-olds and upward, at a mile and a quarter for a prize which carries \$10,000 in added money.

Interest centers in Commander J. K. L. Ross' Cudgel, the mighty son of Broomstick-Eugenia Burch who won it last year; Extremator, sensational winner of the Kentucky derby in 1918 for Willis Sharp Kilmer, and Royce Rolls of the A. K. Macomber stable, which took Cudgel's measure in the Kings county handicap at Jamaica less than a week ago.

## Harlem Players Revive Baseball

## NEW COMPANY TO MAKE TIRES HERE

### Montana Cord Tire Corporation Preparing to Equip Their Plant.

The Montana cord tire, which the newly incorporated Montana Cord Tire company, now organizing, proposes to manufacture in Great Falls, is the result of 15 years' experience and experimenting by the factory manager of the new company, C. J. Drope, who was born and grew up in the atmosphere of the rubber tire industry. One of the incorporators of the new tire company says:

"The Montana Cord Tire company was conceived two years ago and the testing of the Montana cord tire began then. A convincing demonstration was recently made in Chicago by the Yellow Cab company. This company, which operates over 10,000 cars, purchased five sets of these tires, with the following results up to date: First set has already covered 28,000 miles, second set 16,000 miles, and third set 12,000 miles. The other two sets have thus far traveled over 10,000 miles of city streets and all of them still going. This record, which is incomplete, is sufficient for every owner of an automobile to sit up and notice.

"Great Falls, from its location and unexcelled facilities for manufacture and distribution, with the backing of the territory of its own and contiguous states, furnishes a market for the products of the company that cannot be questioned. It is with this prospect in view that the Montana Cord Tire company has been organized.

"The company has been capitalized at \$500,000, common stock. As the management looks upon the enterprise as one which will at once appeal to conservative investors, it has decided to place the issue without the aid of any fiscal agent and without the expenditure of a dollar in promotion fees. It will manufacture both cord and fabric tires and arrangements have already been made for the immediate construction of its first unit of equipment, which will enable it to turn out 300 tires and 500 inner tubes daily. Later on the ultimate production of 1,000 tires a day will be reached.

"The active manufacturing management will be in the hands of practical rubber men, who have been reared in the school of experience."
