Will Not Be Sold for Medicinal Purposes as Far as Known Here.

As far as known now the city will simply just destroy the tons of dandelion school children are expected to dig during the big dandelion extermination campaign starting Monday morning and continuing for one week. Boulevard Superintendent J. B. Sherlock states no plans have as yet been made, at any rate, to dispose of them otherwise.

Dandelions can be utilized in the manufacture of a medicinal tonic which is said to be a blood purifier. They can also be eaten in the form of salads. But there is another purpose for which they can be appreciated in the fall months by many Great Falls people more than these. They can be used in the manufacture of dandelion wine, a popular drink in many households in years past. This is said to be an intoxicant.

It is established under the prohibition law of Montana that no one is permitted to manufacture a fermented drink, wine or anything else, but they can make an unfermented wine. So if there are any persons who know how to utilize dandelions in the manufacture of unfermented wine they may do so.

### FORECLOSURE SUIT FILED

A foreclosure suit, Alice M. Kinsley vs. Phil I. Cole, has been filed in district court. Information alleges that on December 15, 1915 Phil I. Cole and Carrie E. Cole, his wife, delivered to Fred Sweatt a promissory note for \$1200, furnishing a mortgage on certain property as security.
