# Moonshine Whisky Is Being Distilled in Big Quantities in Butte

Butte, May 24.—Moonshine whisky is being manufactured in vast quantities for sale in Butte, according to evidence secured by Special Officer Jack Melta, representing County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson. Officer Melta believes that a still is in operation under the direction of an unknown person designated as "the king of the bootleggers."

Three jugs of "moonshine" were seized Wednesday when Officers Melta, F. C. Coutts and John Seewney raided a place at 308 East Granite street. One jar contained a liquid, colorless as water, possessing an odor similar to that of decaying wood or potatoes. One of the other jars contained an amber-colored liquor, while the "booze" in the third receptacle was ink-colored. It is believed that all were manufactured in the same still but colored for deceptive purposes.

Officer Melta has sent samples of the liquor to a chemist with the request that it be analyzed. "Moonshine" seized a few weeks ago was designated as "denatured alcohol" by the chemist to whom it was submitted.

# Government Starts Suit for Possession of Illicit Still

Helena, May 24.—All of the parts of what is alleged to be an illicit distillery will be seized by federal officials and sold piecemeal. If the owner does not appear in court and designate his claim, according to W. W. Patterson, assistant U. S. district attorney, who today started the first suit in the history of the U. S. district court of Montana to gain possession of an alleged illicit whisky producer. The still and several barrels of corn were seized at Great Falls by internal revenue officers. Petrus Renaud was held in connection with the case.

The list of articles which the government has seized in the case include, one barrel of corn and barley, five tubs of corn and barley mash, three sacks of corn, one barrel, five tubs, one gas stove, tank and burner, two cans gasoline, one jug, one glass funnel, a sack of charcoal and miscellaneous tools, also a coil of garden hose, a garden pump, a bottle of muriatic acid, a bottle of artificial rye flavor, a jug of molasses and yeast mixture. The case will be heard in Helena on June 14.

# Popular Choteau Pastor to Retire From the Ministry

Hall, for four years pastor of the Methodist church, will sever his official connection with the church after the second Sunday in June, and remove with his family to a newly acquired ranch at Whitefish, Mont., where he expects to reside in the future. This change of residence on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Hall is due principally to improve the health of their children. Their eldest son, William, has been out of school all the spring on account of ill health, and Rev. Hall's physician advises a more active outdoor life to build up his son's health.

Choteau regrets to lose the Rev. Mr. Hall and his family. They have endeared themselves to the people of the community, and it will be a loss to have the relations severed. The good wishes of the entire community will follow them to their new home. Rev. Hall formerly served the Methodist church at Whitefish before moving to Choteau.
