DIAMOND LEVELED AT EARLING PARK

Baseball Players Can Now Work With Safety During the Game—Smelters Today.

As the result of an appeal from the Smelter baseball team made by its manager, E. H. Quiguan, the grounds at Earling park have been scraped and the holes which were opened when the War Game show was put on at the park last year have disappeared. Mr. Quiguan took up the matter with Mayor Louis Newman and city teams and equipment were sent to the park to put the grounds in condition as there is a constant demand for the use of the diamond by people from all ranks of life in the city, including the returned soldiers and the smaller boys from the Y. M. C. A. and others.

The smelter team will practice at the park this morning at 11 and it is the plan of the management to use the diamond on Monday and Friday evening this week.

It has been proposed that the Smelters and the Independents, the teams which played the benefit game a week ago, will meet for another engagement on June 1 at the park and that there is no admission charge. The boys who compose the teams are said to be favorable to the plan and as the teams drew such fine patronage and played such excellent ball when they were contesting in the big benefit game a week ago, that sort of a card ought to draw a big crowd, whenever it is staged.

Grinnell Wins First Place in Iowa Track Meet With 48 Points

Des Moines, May 24.—Grinnell college won first place in the intercollegiate section of the annual Iowa state track meet, held at the Drake university stadium today, with 48 points and North High, Des Moines, was victor in the high school section, scoring 19 points.

Iowa state and Ames (Iowa agricultural college) fought closely for second place in the college section, the state university scoring 33 1-3 points and Ames 32 1/2. Simpson and Cornell followed with 16 1/2 and 11, respectively.

Despite perfect weather conditions, fast time was made in only a few events. Downing, of Cornell, set a new mile mark by running the distance in 4:30 3-5, the old record being 4:32 3-5.

Wambsgass Leads American Batters

By Wonderful Spurt He Has Dislodged Joe Jackson of White Sox.

Chicago, May 24.—Joe Jackson, the slugging White Sox outfielder, has been deposed as leading batsman of the American league by Bill Wambsgass of Cleveland, who by a wonderful spurt, boosted his average from .325 to .407 in a week, according to unofficial figures released today. Jackson has dropped to third place with .386, while Smith, Cleveland, remains in second place with .389.

Other batters at the top of the list who have played in 15 or more games including contests of Wednesday are: Jacobson, St. Louis .376; Weaver, Chicago .371; Bodie, New York .368; Witt, Philadelphia .343; Cobb, Detroit .341; Geddon, St. Louis .338; Sisler, St. Louis .324.

Jackson retained his lead in total bases with 49 and also leads in home runs with two. His team mate, Weaver, continued to set the pace as a run getter, having scored 19 times, while Eddie Collins, another team mate, continues to show the way in stolen bases with 10. Chapman's nine sacrifices gives the Cleveland lead in this department.

Faber, Chicago, leads the pitchers with four wins and no losses.

In the national leagues Cravath, Philadelphia, altho participating in only 14 games, leads the batsmen with .563. Of the players who took part in 15 or more games, Young, New York, tops the list with .425 and also is out in front with 46 bases.

Williams, Philadelphia, who is third among the batters with .394, is in a four cornered tie for home run honors with Doyle and Kauff, New York, and Hollocher, Chicago. Each has made three. Myers, Brooklyn, leads the sacrifice hitters with 8, and Olson, Brooklyn is the best run getter and base stealer with 17 and nine, respectively.

Other leading batters are: Muesel, Philadelphia .370; Konetchy, Brooklyn .369; Rariden, Cincinnati .346; Griffith, Brooklyn .341; McCarty, New York .339; Doyle, New York .333; Herzog, Boston .319.

Toledo Homes Will Open for Fight Throngs

Dempsey Tires of Play Training and Does Two-Round Bout.

Toledo, O., May 24.—Chafing under the restraint placed on his training work, Jack Dempsey, today, persuaded Manager Jack Kearns and Jimmy De Forest, his chief trainer, for permission to stop two rounds with Billy Tate, his negro sparring partner. The challenger cuffed Tate around the ring, to the delight of 400 visitors, but neither exchanged damaging blows.

Despite warning of a possible injury to his hands, Dempsey has declined to drop baseball from the training grind. After covering seven and a half miles on the road, the challenger engaged in a game of one O'Cat, this afternoon.

News was received, today, that Willard intended to start for Toledo Monday.


