FILE FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The Crane & Ordway company of St. Paul, which has a branch in Great Falls, has filed a statement with County Clerk Moran. According to this the capital stock of \$1,500,000 has been fully subscribed in money actually paid in, and the assets on January 1, 1919 amounted to \$2,287,304.43. The liabilities amounted to \$787,304.43, being the total assets minus the million and a half capital stock. There is listed a special reserve fund in the liabilities amounting to \$14,560.18.


