AD CLUB LINES UP AS WORKER

New Organization Takes Hand in Promoting Things of Local Interest.

Taking a position among the active civic bodies of the city and identifying itself as an organization supporting community enterprises, the Great Falls Advertising club at its first regular meeting, held in the gymnasium of the Young Women's Christian Association, yesterday took action necessary to co-operation with promoters of the good roads movement and the approaching Fourth of July celebration. The meeting was called primarily for the purpose of announcing committee appointments and transacting business incident to the launching of the organization, but when business details were out of the way the club took under advisement matters associated with the general public good and before adjournment it was unanimously decided to give unqualified endorsement to different civic and municipal enterprises now engaging the attention of the public.

Secretary Norman Thisted, was instructed to confer immediately with Scott Leavitt, president of the Y-G Bee line association, and later in the day he discussed with that official ways and means by which the club can be of assistance in furthering the best interests of the inter-park highway. As matters looking to the improvement of the Bee-line are worked out the club will be in position to be of material assistance to the association and it is its intention to thoroughly familiarize itself with every detail of the road immediately.

To support the Fourth of July celebration, which will be staged here as an organized home-coming and welcome for returned soldiers and sailors under the auspices of the Elks, the club will do whatever it can be of assistance. The celebration will be one of the larger public undertakings of the year and the club's publicity committee will devote much time to features coming naturally within its jurisdiction.

The first purpose of the club is to foster wholesome advertising and to operate to the advantage of publicity matters generally. J. E. Sennette, chosen as the club's first president, was for many years before entering the insurance business connected with publicity work and it was largely thru his efforts that the local organization was formed. The club has in mind the opening of a bureau thru which would be handled copy for advertisements and different details associated ordinarily with such a department.

Four committees were announced yesterday. The publicity and convention committee is composed by L. W. Wendt, Charles Gregg, H. Percy Kaban, C. E. Davis and A. J. Breitenstein. E. J. Daley, J. H. Mills and I. O. Blake comprise the membership committee. E. Homer Stone is chairman of the program committee, the other members being William Steege, LeRoy V. Johnson, Walter W. Freeman and Roscoe Kernan. Norman Thisted, Gordon O. Shafer and R. O. Deming are members of the finance committee.

Scott Leavitt, Henry Pfeister, H. F. Lee, Allen McLean and M. M. Mullen form the executive committee, chosen at the club's first meeting.

The officers are E. J. Sennette, president; Norman Thisted, secretary; John Morrison, treasurer, and E. Homer Stone vice president.

CALL IS AWARDED LARGE JUDGMENT

Jury Gives Him \$13,570 in Suit Bro't Against J. E. Marcum.

W. R. Call was on Friday morning given a jury verdict awarding him judgment for \$13,570 against J. E. Marcum of the Marcum State bank at Cascade. The case was one of the most important civil actions of the present term of district court and suit was bro't by plaintiff to recover back salary he alleged was due him from when he was employed at this bank and also for an interest in the business. He asked for \$39,800, specifying \$20,000 as damages, \$15,400 as good will and \$4,400 as salary. The defendant admitted the salary item.

It was testified that Marcum and Call entered into a co-partnership to conduct a banking business on January 24, 1913, the partnership to extend over a period of 10 years. Marcum, it is said, furnished the \$25,000 working capital and Call was to provide his ability in conducting the business, for which he was to receive \$80 per month, and after all expenses had been paid up and Marcum had drawn 8 per cent on the \$25,000 investment, the remainder of the profits were to have been equally divided.

Call alleged Marcum dissolved the co-partnership without his consent on December 11, 1917, selling the assets. Call thereupon filed suit to recover salary he believed due him and prospective profits he figured he would have made had the partnership continued as agreed between himself and Marcum.

The jury allowed him \$6,400 as his share in the good will of the business, \$4,800 for prospective profits and the remainder of the sum awarded him represented salary.

The case was tried in Judge H. H. Ewing's department of the district court, Marcum being represented by Attorneys Freeman & Thielan and I. W. Church and Fletcher Maddox, and Call engaging the members of the law firm of Cooper, Stephenson & Hoover and Attorney S. J. Cowley.

Forest Fire Doing Some Damage in the Bear Tooth Country

Helena, June 6.—A forest fire stretching over a quarter mile front is reported today in the Bear Tooth country north of Helena where six men from the Bear Tooth country are fighting the flames. It is understood that John C. VanHook, state forester, has gone out to take charge, the fire not being in the federal reserve.

The timber fire east of this city resulting from brush burning, is out. A prairie fire on Mount Helena, a towering butte whose slopes come within the city limits, today threatened the residence of Thomas Hauser. Police and volunteers finally conquered the blaze, the origin of which is unknown.

Group 7 Bankers Gather at Hunter's

Livingston, June 6.—Bankers from Yellowstone, Rosebud, Carbon, Big Horn, Gallatin, Sweet Grass, Stillwater and Park counties are gathering today at Hunter's Hot Springs for the eighth annual convention of Group Seven, Montana Bankers association, which opens at the springs tomorrow morning.

ONLY A NUMBER ON EACH PAPER

Persons Writing on Teacher's Examination No Longer Put Their Names on Work.

For the first time the applicants taking the teachers' examinations in Montana will be known to the state examining board by number only. The applications will be registered with the county superintendent under whom they take the examinations and assigned a number and this number is to be placed by them on their examination booklets in preference to their names. There has never been any evidence of partiality being shown to persons taking the examinations in former years, the number system does away with this possibility, for the papers presented to the state examining board for correction will be merely impersonal and will be given credit for what they contain.

With the change in the system of examining the papers is also a change in the form of the paper used and instead of the large double sheets of ruled paper previously used the applicant is required to write his examinations in a neat booklet, one for each subject with a stiff cover.

Some more red tape has been added for those planning to become teachers for they are now required to fill out a questionnaire when they make the application for a certificate or in other words at the time they take the examinations. In this questionnaire the applicant is required to have a health certificate and a recommendation as to his or her character and experience, the latter to be given to a superintendent, high school principal or other school officer who can speak with authority on this subject, and must be filled in by them and sent to the state department.

There have been 48 teachers taking the examinations at the court house during the past two days under the supervision of county superintendent of schools Miss Jane Keener and her deputy, Miss Mabel Gaylord. The last of the examinations will be held today and the number of applicants will probably reach something over fifty.

Helena to Have Big Week in Collegiate and School Activity

Helena, June 6.—Commencement activities in five schools will be held in this city during the coming week and in nearly all of the schools the classes will be larger than usual. The schools graduating pupils this year are the Montana Wesleyan University with four students receiving degrees of bachelor of arts, two from the commercial departments and 20 from the academy department. The public high school will graduate a class of 61. The Mt. St. Charles college will graduate a class of 25, one with the degree of bachelor of arts from the college department and 24 from the academy. Many of the latter are from Butte and Anaconda. The Deaconess school for children will graduate nearly a score and the St. Helena academy will also present diplomas to a number of girls.

ROBERTS FUNERAL WILL BE SUNDAY

Parents of Victim of Neihart Railroad Accident Will Arrive Here Today.

Because Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Roberts of Creston, Iowa, parents of the unfortunate man, have found it possible to reach Great Falls this evening, the funeral of Conductor Harry J. Roberts, who was killed in the accident near Neihart Wednesday, has been advanced from Monday to Sunday and it will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 in the chapel of the W. H. George company. The parents will be accompanied here by a younger brother, Ross Roberts, while another brother, D. L. Roberts of Miles City, also a railroad man in the employ of the Milwaukee railway company, accompanied by his wife, is already here, and will remain for the funeral Sunday.

It had been planned to have the funeral Monday afternoon at 2 because it was not believed it would be possible for the relatives from Iowa to get here earlier. The information coming from them yesterday that they will be in Great Falls tonight caused the change in the plans.

The bearers for the funeral will all be from the Order of Railway Conductors of which Mr. Roberts was a member and in which he carried a policy for \$3000 life insurance.

THINGS IN FINE SHAPE, HE FINDS

Chairman of Elks Committee Says Plans for Celebration of July 4 Are Shaping.

There was a well attended and enthusiastic meeting of the Elks committee on plans for celebrating the Fourth of July held last night in the Elks temple and when the meeting was over, Chairman James H.
