

MORE TRAVEL PAY COMING TO SOME

Service Men Entitled to Transportation to Actual Residence on Discharge.

Some discharged soldiers and sailors have money coming to them from the government as a result of a recent decision of the treasury department, which allows them travel pay to their actual residence on the day of discharge. Apparently injustice was done some men by the first regulation, which provided travel pay only to the place of induction or enlistment. A number of the men had changed their actual residence since that time and some had enlisted at cities considerably removed from their homes, causing them much expense to get home without remuneration from the government.
These men can secure the difference by filling out applications addressed to the Zone Finance Officers, Lemon Building, Washington, D. C.

SENDS ARGUMENTS FOR P. O. CHANGE

Secretary Skinner of Commercial Club Shows Need of Additions to Federal Building.

Arguments in support of the bill to enlarge the Great Falls postoffice, introduced by Senator H. L. Myers, were forwarded to the Montana senator yesterday by Secretary R. S. Skinner of the commercial club.
Changes and additions to the federal building to cost \$150,000 are contained in the bill, as introduced by Senator Myers. Secretary Skinner pointed out the crowded conditions prevailing in the building at present and showed that the 1,692 postoffice boxes in the local office were reuted with a waiting list of nearly 100 most of the time.
Federal and state offices in the building are also handicapped by the lack of office room. It was pointed out.
