

VENUTO GUILTY HE TELLS COURT

Pays Fine as a Gambler, Being Let Off With Only \$200 Penalty.

Joe Venuto, arrested with Dick Morris, Dan Jackson, Tony Trosley, Otto Frank, Konstantine Kondrovitch, Charles Berginger, George Marsch and Emery Vandehouwer at the Butte Bar Sunday, yesterday appeared in district court, pleaded guilty to a charge of gambling and was fined \$200. Venuto was picked up by Deputy Sheriff E. J. Tait when that officer made a single-handed raid on the Butte Bar and yesterday asked permission to acknowledge his guilt as soon as possible. After entering his plea he waived the statutory time in which to receive his sentence and was immediately ordered to pay \$200 or serve 100 days in jail. He produced the cash and was later released. Morris who has been frequently arrested on charges of gambling, was still detained in the county jail last night, but the others all held as witnesses against Venuto, were ordered released. Morris has been so persistent in breaking into jail on charges of gambling that he might win distinction if prosecuted as an habitual offender.

BRAKEMEN BOTH ARE RECOVERING

The condition of John Kopitzke and J. E. Flemming, the Great Northern brakemen who were injured in the same accident in which Conductor Harry Roberts was killed two weeks ago at Neihart, are much improved, it was reported yesterday by officials of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. Kopitzke's injuries were less serious than those sustained by Flemming and the latter will be confined to the hospital after Kopitzke is able to be about, but neither man as yet has left his bed. Kopitzke was severely bruised about the body and limbs and two ribs were broken, but Flemming sustained a compound fracture of the right leg, a dislocation of the right ankle, injuries to his side, shoulder and head. It is feared that Flemming's leg will be afflicted permanently.

DOGGE GOES TO MAMMOTH

Oscar R. Dogge, formerly with the Associated Press in this city but since his return from France where he served with the American Expeditionary forces in the signal corps of the United States army, with the United Press at Portland, was in the city yesterday and from here will leave today for Mammoth Hot Springs, Yellowstone park, where he will be in charge of the telegraph service of the park during the season. Mr. Dogge was called from Portland to Helena a few days ago by the illness of his mother. She improved and is now on the road of recovery. Yesterday he came to Great Falls with his brother, Dr. Alfred C. Dogge of Polson, accompanied him to Great Falls.

STIPICH SAVED BY BARTENDER

And Fine Smaller Than He Got Off With Week Before; Admit Vending Booze.

Tony Stipich, who runs a soft drink stand in the Black Eagle bar and who was arrested Sunday on a bootlegging charge, was yesterday discharged by Police Magistrate George Raban when his bartender, Matt Ligotich, assumed full responsibility for the violation. Stipich was arrested for the same alleged offense a short time ago, forfeiting \$100 bail on that occasion, but he avoided answering to a second charge when Ligotich pleaded guilty yesterday. Ligotich was fined \$50, which he paid. Stipich and Ligotich were arrested Sunday morning by the police, two colored men, Tom Williams and Frank Thomas, being taken up with them. The negroes were, according to the bartender's plea, being served with whisky at the bar when the police entered, a quantity of whisky was taken to the station as additional evidence, but that any of the liquor was preserved was due only to the tough quality of the bottle in which it was contained. According to the account, Ligotich hurled the bottle on the floor when he saw the police, but it did not break and before he could recover it an officer had it in his possession. The negroes were released after the trial of Ligotich and Stipich.


