KING ORDERED TO MAKE DEED

His Trade of Ford Benton Sanitarium Cancelled by Court—Schultz Gets Land Back.

Annulment of the transaction in which Emil L. Schultz traded a half section of land and gave a \$1,500 note to Rufus L. King for the property known as the Fort Benton sanitarium was ordered in a decree issued yesterday by Judge J. B. Leslie in district court. King is instructed by the court to deliver, within 10 days, a deed conveying the land back to Schultz in fee simple; the note is declared null and void; the mortgage given to secure the note is

found to be without force; King is perpetually restrained from exercising ownership of or control over the land, and it is ordered that he shall take nothing from his counter claim, every point being in favor of Schultz. The case was tried May 17, 1919, and the jury was required to return a verdict in the form of answers to questions arising out of the points at issue between the parties, the court later completing the case by adopting the findings of the jury. The suit was brought by Schultz in an effort to have cancelled the deal he made with King, in which he acquired title to the Fort Benton sanitarium and gave in return the half section of land and his note for \$1,500. Five questions were submitted to the jury, the answer in each case being favorable to the plaintiff. The jury found that he was in no condition mentally to transact business at the time the deal was made; that the defendant represented to the plaintiff that the sanitarium was worth \$10,000 and that he had paid that sum for it; that King represented he had given a ranch worth \$5,300 and \$4,700 in cash when he acquired the sanitarium; that \$8,000 was a reasonable value to fix on the Schultz ranch, and that \$2,500 was a reasonable value for the sanitarium. The Schultz ranch embraces lot 4, south half of the northwest quarter, north half of the southwest quarter, section 4, township 23 north, south half of the southeast quarter, section 32; southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section 33, township 24 north, all in range 9 east.

WAIT FOR LATER TRAIN AND WIN

Persons Going to Neihart Should Go to Arrington on Train 44 and Change.

Passengers leaving Great Falls for stations on the Neihart branch gain nothing by taking the mixed train leaving the local depot at 6:15 in the morning, it was announced yesterday by Great Northern officials. On the contrary, passengers taking the mixed train must detrain at Gerber and wait while the run is being made to Sand Coulee and Stockett and back, arriving at Arrington after No. 44 has passed that station. By waiting in Great Falls for No. 44, which leaves at 7:50, one hour and 35 minutes can be saved, the disagreeable wait at Gerber can be avoided and perfect connections can be made at Arrington. Yesterday there were about 30 passengers at the Great Northern station who desired to take the mixed train, but they were not allowed to get aboard. Instructions had been given for them to wait for No. 44 and there were a few who were inclined to become indignant when they were compelled to wait for the next train after arriving at the station for the 6:15. Later in the day an order was issued permitting passengers for the Neihart branch to board the mixed train, but with the proviso that they detrain at Gerber while the Stockett branch is being covered.

FINDS 10 WHERE LAW IS VIOLATED

Local Stores Warned by State Health Board Officials About Displaying Goods.

Ten retail establishments in Great Falls were yesterday found by H. M. Shea, director of the division of food and drugs of the state board of health, to be exhibiting eatables in violation of a ruling of the board which prohibits the display of certain foodstuffs outside of showcases or other covered containers. The dealers were asked by Director Shea to discontinue the practice and in every case it was readily agreed that the ruling should be rigidly observed in the future. A second inspection will be made in a short time and violators of the rule will be reported to the county attorney for prosecution. Stores whose failure to observe the order was discovered by Director Shea were Funks Five and Ten cent store, confections; the Palace Gardens, confections; the Relewitz store, confections; Chocolate Shops, numbers one and two, confections; Page Meat Co., meats; The Bee Hive, confections; the Mecca Inn, confections; Stephen's Palace of Sweets, confections, and Dugdale's store, confections.

The board's ruling covers displays both inside and outside of stores, but local violations had occurred only in cases where goods were on display within doors. The whole ruling reads: "The sidewalk display of food products is prohibited unless such products are enclosed in show-cases or similar device which will protect the same from flies, dust or other contamination; provided, that food products that necessarily have to be peeled, pared or cooked before they are fit for consumption may be displayed on the sidewalk; provided, that in such display the bottom of the container be at least eighteen inches above the surface of the sidewalk; but the sidewalk display of meat products is prohibited. No person shall expose, sell or offer for sale any bread stuffs, pies, cake, pastry, candy or confectionery, on any show-case, counter, table or rack, or outside of any building, in any open window or doorway, or on any sidewalk, street, alley or thoroughfare, except that they be covered so as to thoroughly protect them from dust, dirt, flies and other extraneous matter."

MINING ATTRACTS THESE VISITORS
