

ONE CASE LEFT OF TRUCK LOAD

Thieves Take From Box Car at Windham Beer Hauled There From Local Brewery.

If the luck of the Lewistown sheriff holds good he will eventually receive one lonely case of beer upon which to exercise his powers of destruction, but it has been neither written nor granted by the powers that be that the remainder of the truck load hauled from Great Falls brewery to Windham last Tuesday will ever find its way into a sewer, however great may have been the efforts of the sheriffs of two counties to reduce it to that ignominious state. The beer was seen by Deputy Sheriff Bid Wood when the truck passed thru Raynesford Tuesday and the deputy started in pursuit. Before he could overtake the truck it had been unloaded, not at Stanford, as reported Wednesday, but at Windham, the next station to the east. The driver had started back to Great Falls by a different road and the deputy missed him, but, since the beer had been taken out of Cascade county, he notified Sheriff J. H. Stevens at Lewistown and returned to Raynesford.

Sheriff Stevens arrived at Windham as soon as he could cover the 40 miles intervening between that town and his office, and when he reached there only 32 cases remained, the other 18 having evaporated in the excessive heat. Nor was this all. Examination proved that of the 32 remaining cases only 16 had anything resembling contents. The bottles from the others had evaporated in the heat, too. Sixteen full cases, however, were gathered up and placed in a box car, which was tightly sealed with the seal of the railroad administration of the United States. Yesterday morning a solitary case remained when the agent went on duty.

The 16 empties and 15 of the full cases had been taken by someone who refused to respect the great seal of the railroad administration when by breaking that seal he could discover a way of becoming unconscious to 100 degrees Fahrenheit. It is not reported that any trace of the missing beer was obtained.
