

INVENTS SYSTEM TO RUN AUTO 75 MILES ON QUART GASOLINE

American Ambulance Driver in Paris Devises Great Gas Saving Scheme.

Paris, June 25.—Warren Whipp, of Cleveland, Ohio, employed in Paris as a chauffeur for the Red Cross, has invented an appliance enabling an automobile to run seventy-five miles on a quart of gasoline. The new appliance dispenses with a carburetor, feeding the gasoline directly to the cylinders with a secret condensing and spraying arrangement.

COCCHI GIVES DETAILS OF DISMEMBERMENT OF BODY OF RUTH CRUGER

Bologna, June 25.—The trial of Alfred Cocchi, charged with the murder of Ruth Cruger in New York in 1917, has been interrupted to enable the court to examine the American court records with reference to testimony given in the Cocchi case regarding Cocchi's wife.

There was a spirited exchange between Signor Bagnoli, president of the court, and Cocchi yesterday. Cocchi told of having saved the body of Miss Cruger so that he might hide it. Then he broke down, crying in a broken voice:

"I took the body and tried to conceal it in the cellar, but the door was not large enough and I saved the body in two. The girl was dead when this was done."

Then followed a discussion between Signor Bagnoli and Cocchi as to whether the girl was dead before her body was dismembered. The whole court room was agitated at the prisoner's narration, but Cocchi rapidly proceeded with his story, being apparently very nervous.

DODGE IS REPORTED WANDERING ABOUT IN CUSTER COUNTY

Miles City, June 25.—S. C. Dodge, the missing Livingston miller, is believed to be wandering in the vicinity of Hathaway, Custer county. A traveling man who was coming thru in an automobile with his wife offered a man answering his description, a ride to Miles City, but was refused. A few moments after the engine died down and when the wanderer saw it stop he turned and ran in the opposite direction.

As the result of this report Deputy Sheriff Luther Middleton went to Hathaway today and searched for Dodge. No trace of him could be found, except that a rancher had noticed a man, whom he identified from a picture of Dodge which was shown him, as the man he had seen yesterday walking first in one direction and then the other, behaving as if he was mentally irresponsible.

NO NEWS IN LIVINGSTON.

Special to The Daily Tribune. Livingston, June 25.—No news of the finding of S. C. Dodge, local flour mill manager, who has been missing since June 4, had been received by his wife or by the sheriff here up to 9 o'clock tonight.

Dodge left his home in Livingston June 3, intending to go to Helena and Great Falls on business and had announced he would return the following day. A week later the case was turned over to the sheriff by his wife, and word to search for the missing man was sent to police officers throughout the northwest.

KALISPELL YOUTH KILLED; DYNAMITE EXPLODES ON ROAD

O'Connell, of Kalispell, was so badly injured by a dynamite explosion on the Swan Lake road about noon today that he died at Big Fork en route to this city. He was working for the Somers Lumber company, and was walking from Camp 4 to Camp 1 at the head of Swan Lake. A road gang had planted a dynamite charge and O'Connell, falling to receive the charge, was almost directly over the charge when it exploded. A man, whose name was not learned, was with him, but was not badly injured.

SMITH'S ATTORNEY REFUSES CHALLENGE OFFERED BY LEASE

Special to The Daily Tribune. Helena, June 25.—Wordy clashes between Burton K. Wheeler, one of the attorneys for the state, and F. E. Lease, a trial here on charges of sedition, and N. T. Lease, member of the State Council of Defense, occurred at the close of the day's session in the court-house hallway late this afternoon.

Governor Stewart, chairman of the State Council of Defense, had been answering all questions did not please the attorneys for the defense. N. T. Lease of Great Falls, another member of the council, also testified, which also evidently riled Mr. Wheeler, judging from his post session remarks. Wheeler's remarks against Mr. Lease in the same class as the man Diogenes sought with a lantern.

Mr. Lease had been mild-mannered and courteous when on the witness stand but when he heard Wheeler's remarks he remonstrated against them. He was insistent he was wholly truthful in his testimony as a witness for the state and that he objected to any one inferring that such was not the case. Wheeler stated that there might still be a question of doubt remaining. Mr. Lease then replied, "You and I are but a short distance from the street. We might therefore adjourn down there and have it out." Mr. Wheeler by that time however was half way down the steps and continued on his journey.

Senate Passes Army Appropriation Bill

Washington, June 25.—The army appropriation bill, carrying \$888,000,000 and providing for an average army of 400,000 men next year, an increase over the house bill of \$17,000,000 in funds and 100,000 in personnel, was passed late today by the senate without a roll call and sent to conference.

Refusal of Woman to Bathe Causes Riot

Tacoma, June 25.—Four young women inmates of the city detention hospital were found guilty, today, of rioting against their attendants and were sentenced to 30 days in jail. The riot broke out when hospital attendants attempted to force one inmate to take a bath.

NEW SERIES OF CERTIFICATES IS TO BE ISSUED SOON

Washington, June 25.—Two new series of short term 4 1/2 per cent certificates of indebtedness were announced today by the treasury department to be dated July 1. One issue will mature September 15 and the other December 15, dates on which income and excess profit taxes are due.

ACTION ON SENATE PEACE DECLARATION DEFERRED FOR TIME

Fall's Resolution is Laid Over Temporarily—Borah Attacks League Covenant.

Washington, June 25.—Failing to command the united support of the opponents of the league of nations, the proposal for an immediate declaration of peace by congress was blocked today in the senate foreign relations committee.

After long and lively discussion the committee voted, 12 to 4, to defer action for the present on the resolution of Senator Fall, republican, New Mexico, embodying the peace declaration. Five senators opposing the league including Chairman Lodge, joined league advocates in supporting the postponement motion. Those voting for immediate action were Senator Borah, Idaho; Fall, New Mexico; Johnson, California; and Moses, New Hampshire, all republicans.

A special meeting to resume consideration of the resolution was called for Monday and Senator Fall predicted a favorable report of the measure would result. Its opponents declared discussion today revealed such strong opposition in the committee that favorable action would be impossible.

NORTH DAKOTA TO VOTE ON MANY NON-PARTISAN REFERENDUMS TODAY

Fargo, June 25.—An unusually heavy vote is expected thruout the state tomorrow on the referendum to pass upon various measures adopted by the last legislature, chiefly concerning the state industrial program of the non-partisan league. Chief interest centers in the industrial commission and state bank laws as related laws will be affected if these should be voted down.

Fire Fighters Save City of Golden From Flames of Forest Fire

Denver, June 25.—Volunteer fire fighters, assisted by members of the Denver fire department, fought all last night to save the city of Golden, about 15 miles from here, from a forest fire started on Lookout mountain by campers. Early today the fire was reported under control.

PROHIBITION

There has been no straight prohibition and anti-prohibition alignment in the voting heretofore on amendments. Some of the prohibitionists have supported amendments eliminating drastic features and they have agreed that it is necessary to separate the measures in order to get action before the country goes "dry" next week.

Dr. Wilbur F. Criss, superintendent of the International Reform league suggested to the senate committee that the proposed bill be amended so as to prevent private citizens holding large stocks of liquor after the country becomes dry. Without such an amendment there would be discrimination between persons of moderate means and those of wealth, he said, but Senator Walsh, Montana, suggested this situation could be reached by imposing heavy taxes upon such reserve stocks.

Montana Baby Born on Transport on Voyage From France

New York, June 25.—The transport Santa Teresa docked here from St. Nazaire with 1,915 troops and 29 "war brides." The principal unit on board was the 149th provisional battalion, 35 officers and 1,885 men. A baby, born on the voyage to the French wife of F. E. Smith of Gildford, Mont., was christened Marcelle Teresa Smith after the ship and was presented with a christening fund of 1,800 francs by the officers and crew of the vessel.


