

GIANT BRITISH DIRIGIBLE READY FOR ATLANTIC FLIGHT

Word that the British dirigible P-34 has started on its attempt to cross the Atlantic ocean to America from England is expected hourly. The giant dirigible is ready for the flight. According to recent reports the big ship may attempt to fly to the U. S. and back without landing in this country, as it can carry enough supplies to make the round trip. This type of dirigible was designed for bombing German cities. One interesting feature of the construction of the ship is a passageway thru the gas bag by which the members of the crew can go from one of the suspended "gondolas" to another. A ladder leads up to the passageway from each bag. The ladder can be seen in the photo of one of the gondolas. The crew of the ship totals thirty-three men.

FORSYTH CITIZENS TAR AND FEATHER M. BARON, TAILOR

Baron, a Jew tailor of this city Monday morning and removed him from his home to about a mile from town and gave him a suit of tar well coated with feathers. A neighbor living next door heard the commotion and started out, but was ordered back and went. He says there was not over a dozen men in the crowd, but that they were very orderly and quiet about their work. After they got Baron from the house they quickly disappeared with their captive in the cars.

Shortly after daylight a rancher about a mile from here saw something in the brush and took it for a wild man or an animal that might have escaped from the circus at Hysham, and spread the alarm in town. Investigation proved it to be Baron. He had not been hurt up or misused any, but had a complete coat of tar and feathers from head to foot.

It is alleged that Baron made improper advances to a 10-year-old girl employed in his home as house maid for his little daughter. He refused to make any statement of any kind concerning the matter. He has a wife and one child. As to who the abductors were, no clue has yet been learned.

Malta Promises Full Program for Soldiers

Malta, June 25.—Everything is in readiness for the big soldiers convention to be held in Malta, June 30 and July 1. The program of the entertainment for the two days has been outlined and is very extensive and not a dull minute will find its way to the visitors. The people of Malta have taken every step possible to make the first convention one of the best that will ever be held in the state.

Governor Stewart will be the first speaker on the program from outside of Malta, and his talk will be followed by several others of prominence. The stage is all set for the big barbecue, which will be one of the features of the two days celebration. Bucking contests, ball games, dancing and competitive drilling will entertain the crowd. A new attraction just added, and one of the big ones that will prove to be interesting, is the securing of Jack Maboe and his airplane for two flights to be made in Malta. He will leave Havre early Monday morning and circle each town between his home and Malta, arriving at the convention grounds about nine o'clock. He has promised the people of the convention that anyone caring to take a trip to the clouds will be accommodated. His plane is a three passenger affair.

FIRE SITUATION IN MONTANA DISTRICT IS MUCH IMPROVED

Missoula, June 25.—The forest fire situation in district Number one, comprising Montana and northern Idaho, today was reported at forest service headquarters here to be improved. One thousand extra fire fighters now in the field have established control lines around all dangerous fires, it was stated, and will be able to prevent their spread if favorable weather continues and no high winds arise. For free sample... Two new fires in each of the Cabinet and the St. Joe forests were reported today. Blazes on Big creek and Deep creek, today, were being held within trenches.

PINE CONES AID FIRES

Helena, June 25.—The forest fire near Canyon Ferry is under control after having burned over several thousand acres, according to John C. Van Hook, state forester, but a new blaze has broken out on Ox Bow bend, 30 miles north of Helena. A crew of 10 men has been sent there. Ox Bow bend is in a rough and mountainous district, outside the federal reserve and much state and private land is in that neighborhood. At the headquarters of the forestry service here no fires have been reported in the Helena forest, it is said. "Pine cones as an agency for the spread of forest fires constitute one of the greatest menaces state and federal forestry officials have to combat," declares Van Hook.

"These cones, piled in heaps under trees on hillsides, become ignited in the same inexplicable manner in which most forest fires are started, and the first thing they do is to start rolling down the hill, leaving a trail of blazes and starting hundreds of other cones on like missions. It is difficult to estimate the damage in dollars caused by these cones, but the amount is tremendous. The danger from them is increased by the difficulty in checking them. They roll against the wind and over bare spots. Once a big fire is started by them, it will continue without their aid."

Free Tuberculosis Tests for All Montana Cattle

Helena, June 25.—Free tuberculosis tests for all cattle in Montana is provided in a plan announced today by Dr. Rudolph Snyder, in charge of the federal bureau of animal industry in Montana, and Dr. W. J. Butler, state veterinarian. This plan is approved by the United States animal industry headquarters in Washington in a telegram received by Dr. Snyder. It will be put into operation immediately upon the passage by congress of the agricultural appropriation bill. Inspectors will be maintained in the following cities: Kalispell, state inspector; Missoula, federal; Butte, state; Dillon, federal; Helena, federal and state; Great Falls, federal and state; Bozeman, federal; Billings, federal and state; Lewistown, state; Miles City, federal and state; Glendive, state; Malta, state; Scooby, federal. "If cattle owners come into this plan, which is not compulsory, we can rid Montana of cattle tuberculosis in seven years," declared Dr. Snyder.

WARN CAMPERS TO BE CAREFUL

Butte, Mont., June 25.—Co-operation of the public in preventing forest fires this summer is asked in a statement issued by the Deer Lodge National forest here today. It is pointed out that the forest reserve is like tinder because of the drought. There have been 14 fires to date but none of them was serious. A small fire occurred in the reserve last night near Lake Delmo in Jefferson county. It was reported under control at midnight. Campers are being warned to extinguish fires before breaking camp.

SEIZE 1100 QUARTS OF BEER AT HAVRE IN LIBERTY HOTEL

Havre, June 25.—Contending that eleven hundred quarts of beer was too much for a private stock under the present dry conditions existing in Havre, Chief of Police McKinnon and Patrolman Roberts, assisted by Deputy U. S. Marshal Goff and F. J. Buscher of Great Falls, a special revenue officer, seized forty-nine cases containing the above amount of beer from the basement of the Liberty hotel in Havre at an early hour this morning, loaded a truck and took the consignment to the city jail, where it is now safely stored under lock and key. The frequency of alleged "stew" parties at this place led the officers to the belief there must be a private distillery somewhere in the building but when the officers located the beer in the basement it bore a Great Falls trade mark and the government officials were of the opinion that it was part of a shipment that so mysteriously disappeared in Great Falls only a few days ago. The Liberty hotel is operated by Mrs. Thomas Casey and shortly after the raid her husband was placed under arrest but later released on bond. Mrs. Casey was also arrested and gave bond for her appearance in justice court.

Locomotives Must Have Illuminated Numbers

Helena, June 25.—Railways operating in Montana are given until November 1 to comply with the state law requiring that all locomotives and electric motors used be equipped with illuminated numbers on the headlight. This date was fixed in an order issued today by the state railroad commission, which has conducted two hearings upon the subject. The illuminated numbers must be uniform on each railway system, and must be sufficiently large to be easily read and identified from a passing or meeting train. The Northern Pacific plan of placing the number in a hood over the headlight, and the Oregon Short Line plan of a number on each side of the headlight were given approval, but no specific plan was ordered.

ROUNDUP DISTRICT RIFE WITH RUMORS OF OIL DISCOVERY

Special to The Daily Tribune. Roundup, June 25.—Rumors are flying thick concerning oil developments in this district and it is reported that the oil well in the Woman's Pocket will be shot this week. Reports are prevalent that oil in small quantities has already been struck there and that when the charge of nitro is exploded a gusher will result. Holders of Tri City stock are confident that they have struck it rich, while the Devils Basin prospectors are certain that if oil is found in the pocket, they also will strike the precious fluid. Work on the Devil's Basin property is being pushed, truck loads of timbers and casing being hauled out, in readiness for completing the old well and starting the new one. Many leases on supposedly oil land have been filed at the court house, and every one is talking oil prospects. Indications so far have justified the expenditure of considerable sums of money in development work, and now that still more work is projected by other companies, it is believed that oil will eventually be struck here.

WARNS TYPHOID MAY FOLLOW SHORTAGES OF WATER SUPPLY

Helena, June 2.—Warning of typhoid as a possible outcome of the water shortage reported in many sections of Montana, is contained in a message sent today to the city and county health officers by Dr. W. F. Cogswell, secretary of the state board of health.

"There is no typhoid epidemic in the state, and that is one reason why we are taking all these precautions," Dr. Cogswell said. "We intend to prevent the outbreak of one if it is possible."

All water sources tapped to supplement a city's regular water supply must be tested, Dr. Cogswell tells health officials, and the state board of health must receive a report detailing all circumstances of the water addition before it can be used.

Vaccination against typhoid is urged upon all cities and sections where water supply is changed or increased, and upon all persons in the state generally. Campers particularly are urged to submit to vaccination, as it is next to impossible for them to determine whether the water they use is contaminated.

Free vaccine for the use by officers who will administer it free of charge is offered in any quantity by the state board of health, Dr. Cogswell says. In some cities this plan is now in operation and certain hours of the day are set aside when vaccinations will be made.

He purchased 19 ewes, and when they were sheared he realized \$130 from the wool. From the sale of mutton he received \$72.40, the pelts sold for \$32.50 and he sold nine lambs at \$15 each, making a total return in one year of \$389.90 for his little band of sheep, with practically no expense.
