YANKS DO WELL IN PARIS MEET

American Athletes Win Five Firsts and Two Seconds in Track Event Heats.

Pershing Stadium, France, June 25.—American athletes won five firsts, two seconds, the third and fifth place in the first nine preliminary track event heats run off yesterday, the first day of the inter-allied games. In boxing, American won one bout and lost one.

Al Norton of California previously had won in the light heavyweight preliminaries from Herscovitz of Canada. The Canadian was at a disadvantage thru the American's longer reach and greater height, but he fought pluckily thru the ten rounds. A large crowd of American soldiers watched the bout intently.

The first knockout went to Spalla of Italy, who sent Van De Eynd of Belgium to the mat for the count of ten in the second round.

Hallam of Great Britain gave a good exhibition, winning from Cole of Canada in the first featherweight bout.

American wrestlers lost their first two Greco-Roman wrestling bouts. Weegan, American, was thrown by Daly in four minutes and twenty seconds. Polk, American, wrestled Coles of Belgium to a standstill for twenty minutes, when the bout was stopped and an extra period ordered by the referee. Coles then threw Polk with a rolling fall.

Paddock, who played in the semi-finals of the 100 meter dash in the inter-allied games in France yesterday, is enrolled as a student at the University of Southern California. At the last southern California amateur athletic union open track and field meet he ran the 100 yard dash in 9 4-5 seconds and the 220 yards dash in 21 4-5 seconds.

It is said to be the largest trout ever caught in Montana. He caught a 12-pounder a few minutes later. The weight of both was certified by the secretary of the Butte Angler's club, which yearly offers prizes for the biggest catch.

FOLSTER IS HELD, CHECK REPUDIATED

R. J. Folster, who first gave his name to Chief of Police Marcus Anderson as Andrew Wood, was arrested on Fourth street yesterday afternoon on a forgery charge after he had tendered a check at the Berger store and failed to wait for the cash. The check was for \$10, was payable to Andrew Wood and purported to bear the signature of F. M. Pinkerton. Folster offering the explanation that he had won it playing pool Tuesday night with a man who issued the check under that name. There is a man of the name F. M. Pinkerton in Great Falls and Chief Anderson located him after arresting Folster, but he declared that he had never issued the check and that he did not know Folster. Folster admitted that Pinkerton was not the man with whom he had played pool, but insisted he received the check from a man that used the name of Pinkerton at the pool hall.

When Folster left the \$10 check at the Berger store yesterday he said he would be back after the cash, but the department was immediately notified and Chief Anderson caught the man near the Conrad grocery as he was hurrying towards Central avenue.

Later in the day Folster was positively identified by the manager of the Equity store as the man who passed a bad \$10-check at his place a short time ago. At that time he was wearing clothes different from those he had on when arrested, but the missing garments were found in his room. Two other checks were reported last evening, supposedly the work of Folster. These were passed at the McDonald shoe store and the Conrad grocery and were both for \$10. The name of Adolph Venetz was used by the forger and the signature is said to have been cleverly imitated.

VENUTO ACCUSES PARTNER DONETTI

Joe Venuto has brot suit in district court as a means of legally terminating his partnership with Frank Donetti, with whom he has been associated in the proprietorship of the Butte pool hall since May 15. The plaintiff alleges that his partner has appropriated company money to his individual use and has refused to allow the plaintiff on the premises, threatening him with a gun, according to the complaint, and declaring that he would continue to make personal use of the firm's funds.

Venuto asks that his partner be required to make an accounting and also requests that the firm's debts be paid and the company dissolved.

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Extend Filing Time of July 4 Entries

Soldier and Sailor Athletes Given Until Sunday to Get Into Competition.

Entries in the athletic events for soldiers and sailors on July 4 were originally scheduled to close last evening, but an extension of time until Sunday has been granted by the sports committee, in order to give greater opportunity for larger entries.

The number of contestants is not as large as the committee would like to have it and all returned service men with any athletic ability are urged to enter the various events, which include boxing, wrestling, 100-yard dash, shot put, three-legged race and sack race. Big money prizes are offered the winners and in a number of cases to the runners-up.

The company was formed recently for the purpose of financing the building of a pavilion in this city in which may be conducted livestock shows and sales. The stock subscriptions have already exceeded \$20,000 and work will be started soon it is expected, on the building which the company will own. The meeting this evening will adopt by-laws and discuss plans for the pavilion which it is expected will cost approximately \$25,000.
