CONFERENCE AT BUTTE MONDAY

Anaconda Employees Will Formulate Proposition for Company at That Meeting.

There has been much conjecture about Great Falls as to whether the coming of July 1 would mean the close down at the B. & M. smelter, that being the date when the wage agreement between the Anaconda Copper Mining company and the employees terminates and when a new agreement is supposed to begin. It appears reasonable that it may be fore-casted there will be no close down of the plant for at least some days after July even if the company and the employees are not able to agree on a new working contract.

It has been learned that the conference of the several organizations of the employees will be started at Butte on Monday for the purpose of preparing the final draft of the proposition which the employees will submit to the company for its consideration. It is believed that this will take two or three days and after it is presented, then the company will either accept, reject or make a counter proposition which might, of course, bring an arbitration in its wake. In the ordinary course of events, it is thought that there is little reason for concluding that there will be cessation at the local smelter, at least for several days, no matter what the outcome of the negotiations might prove to be.

C. W. Sprague and E. W. Bowers, vice president of the Great Falls metal trades council, have been selected to represent the Great Falls reduction department at the conference of employees and they will go to Butte on Sunday for the sessions of Monday and will continue for the entire conference.

BENNET ORDERS MORRIS LET GO


County Attorney Advises Sheriff There Is Not Evidence to Prove Gambling Charge.

Dick Morris, five times arrested within a few months on charges of gambling and recently released from the county jail after serving a term for that offense, was discharged from custody yesterday by Sheriff J. P. Burns on instructions from the county attorney's office. The reason given for his release was that no evidence could be obtained against him.
