STATE COMMISSIONERS URGENT ADOPTION OF PRIMARY MEASURE

Helena, June 28.—While a convention called by Attorney General S. C. Ford and J. T. Carroll, clerk of the state supreme court, and composed of both democrats and republicans, was meeting here tonight to take action to defeat referendum measure number 13, which is to be submitted to the people at a special election, called yesterday by Governor Sam V. Stewart for September 2, a statement was issued by the democratic and republican state central committees explaining the proposed amendment in detail and urging its passage at the referendum election. The statement by the central committees was signed by John A. Tressler of Malta, the republican chairman; Hugh Wells of Miles City, the democratic chairman; J. W.
