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STATE LOSES PLACE AS PRIMARY MARKET OF BIG WOOL CLIPS

 Helena, June 29.—E. S. May, woolbuyer for the Jeremiah Williams company, of Boston who was here today said that Montana is no more a primary wool market because of the widespread settlement of public lands by homesteaders and that the big clips belong to the days gone by. In 1896 a buyer could go to Great Falls and Miles City markets and bid upon any part of 44,000,000 pounds of wool and get action on big lots. Now the total clip for the year will not exceed 18,000,000 pounds, Mr. May said. He added that Wyoming and Arizona are now the big wool markets, those states retaining the big ranges needed by the immense sheep outfits which were strong in Montana until a few years ago.

TOWN OF LIBBY TURNED OVER TO THE RETURNED SOLDIERS FOR THE 4TH

 Libby, June 29.—Answering the request of a committee from Austin Reedy Camp No. 5, United War Veterans, Mayor Barrett of Libby has announced that the city will be turned over to the soldiers on July 4. The camp has charge of the big Fourth of July celebration to be held here, and is making elaborate plans to hold one of the most successful celebrations Libby has ever seen. The city will be guarded by military police appointed by the soldiers from among their own number, and Ferd Bockman, recently returned from the service, has been designated as chief of military police force for the day.

FERGUS STOCK OWNERS LOOK FOR PASTURE ON MICHIGAN PENINSULA

 Lewistown, June 29.—Judge Roy E. Ayers of this city, head of the Ayers Stock company, and Tom Shaw, of Beckst, one of the most experienced stockmen of the state, left yesterday for the northern peninsula of Michigan to investigate grazing conditions there. The range in this county, owing to the prolonged dry, hot weather, is in very poor shape and the stockmen find themselves in a really serious situation. Messrs. Ayers and Shaw are making this trip in the interests of the stockmen of the whole county, hence the result of their mission is awaited with much interest. They expect to make a report in the next 10 days.

BIG MILL AT LIBBY TO GO ON DOUBLE SHIFT THEREBY ADDING 150 MEN

 Libby, June 29.—After operating at half production for two years the big lumber mill at Libby will go on double shift basis Monday, July 7. Walter Neile, manager of the J. Neile Lumber company, authorized the statement that two eight-hour shifts would be put on at that time taking the place of the one ten-hour shift now operating. The increase means an addition of about 150 men on the payroll of the company in the mill and logging camps and will mean a great deal to the business prosperity of Libby. There seems to be no doubt that plenty of men can be easily obtained to fill out the needed crews.

VOLCANO SULPHUR DUST IS FALLING AT DAWSON

Dawson, Y. T., June 27.—A yellow substance, believed today by chemists to be sulphur, probably carried from some distant volcano, fell with the rain at Dawson last night and streaked sidewalks and roofs. Similar precipitations were reported from Eagle, Alaska and Northern British Columbia points.
