### DECORATION OF STREETS TODAY

Force of Decorators Arrive From Butte—Merchants Urged to Add to Beauty.

Decorators of the streets of Great Falls for the Fourth of July celebration will begin this morning. Phil C. Goodwin, the decorating contractor, and a force of men arriving to start the work. The decoration is in charge of the decoration committee of the Fourth of July celebration committee and will be made from curb to curb. Decorations of the sidewalks and the buildings will be up to the occupants and owners and they are urged by the members of the committee to do their part to assist in making Central avenue the most beautiful street in Montana on the Fourth of July.

Special prizes are being offered by the committee for the best decorated store front and for the best window display of the merchants. Fifty dollars will go to the winner and \$25 has been offered as second prize. The double incentive of a cash prize and of enhancing the decorations of the street is expected to result in some keen rivalry among the business firms of the city and the committee believes it will make Central avenue a veritable red, white and blue highway.

Cash prizes have also been set aside for floats in the parade on the Fourth and it is believed that this will be a big feature of the procession next to the military parade. A number of lodges are preparing some wonderful creations for that day, but the members of the committee wish to emphasize that the competition is an open one and they desire that as many floats be entered as possible. All of them will be given a place in the parade and be given consideration by the judges.

All the street decorations will be in place by Wednesday evening. It is expected, and the Red Cross bower will be ready for the first street dancing of Thursday evening on Central avenue and Third streets north and south.

### MOST OF THE STATE FOREST FIRES ARE NOW UNDER CONTROL

Missoula, June 29.—Except for the serious fire in the Sweet Grass canyon near Big Timber in the Absaroka forest, there are now few serious blazes in any of the woods of district No. 1, of the forest service, according to reports received today at headquarters here. Eighty-six men are engaged in fighting that fire which is burning on Crazy Horse mountain.

The headquarters today received reports of a serious loss which it suffered in the disastrous fire at Billings, Saturday. The offices and all the records of the supervisor of the Beartooth forest were destroyed in the fire. These losses include all the historical accounts of the forest, together with the statistics and highly valuable information concerning the timber resources of the Beartooth.

Thirty men who had been fighting the Big creek fire near Haugan in the Lolo have been laid off, it is reported, as that fire is controlled.

The Warm Springs fire in the Deer Lodge forest and the six mile fire in the Lolo both are now under control.

### British Planes to Essay Trans-Pacific Flight to Australia

Miles City, June 29.—Several British planes will start across the Pacific on August 15, from San Diego bound for Australia according to a statement made here today by Captain William McDonald, of Melbourne, Victoria, who is here on his way to southern California via Seattle.

He stated today that while full details of the trip have not been decided upon, the date for the start has been set and that the trip would be made with stops at Honolulu, Gotta Percha, a small British island near Guam, and Nagasaki. He will pilot one of the planes himself.

Captain McDonald served throughout the war in the Canadian flying forces in Europe and has a record of having brought down many German planes. If he can obtain a plane, he will probably make an exhibit flight here during the Miles City Round-Up which takes place July 3, 4 and 5.

### Lavina Businessmen in Favor of Division

A special committee was appointed to cooperate with the Ryegate committee which has charge of the campaign, and which has engaged Dan McKay, professional county splitter, to supervise the work in preparing for the election.

### ALLIED SUPREME ECONOMIC COUNCIL TO CONTINUE WORK

Meeting Place Will Be Transferred From Paris to London.

(Chicago Tribune Cable Copyright.) Rome, June 29.—via Paris, June 29.—The allied supreme economic council, which has been sitting in Paris during the peace conference, will continue its existence, transferring its headquarters soon, I learned today from an authoritative source.

The American members of the council, previous to its decision, announced they had no authority to remain after peace is signed, but Lord Robert Cecil, one of the British members, requested them to stay at least in an advisory capacity. This was agreed and post-peace meetings of the British, French, Italian and American members will be held in London.

and financial leaders of the United States and Italy are planning a great revival of trade between the two countries after peace is signed. American business men also are doing their utmost to find out the needs of stricken Europe, and there is a general tendency to arrange American trade abroad for the benefit of Europe as well as of the United States.

At the request of representatives of the United States Chamber of Commerce, Dante Ferraris of the Italian commission, member of the supreme economic council and one of the leading engineers of Italy, has arranged with British and French members of the council to send an official mission to the United States in September to explain to the country the real and pressing needs of Europe.

The French delegates will be headed by Clementel, director of commerce, the British delegates probably by Lord Robert Cecil, who has been handling the league of nations question and economic matters for the British peace commission, the Italian mission by Minister Crespi, formerly head of the food administration, now one of the Italian peace commissioners.

Young Daly had just returned to his home in Missoula after the close of the year's work at Gonzaga university, Spokane.

### Snowy Mountain Man Marries Bynum Girl
