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Fashions and Other Things

On the principle that anything that is scarce is always very much in demand, a buyer of a large eastern bead company, who recently returned from Europe, views the bead situation in a trade paper dealing with women's wear.

"All during the time of the war when the countries that contributed most to the bead industry were unable to do so, it was necessary for us to get our beads from Italy and Japan," said the buyer. "Now that there is an over-abundance of the bead industry has again started up and we will once more get the real beads. When I say real beads I mean those that were formerly called the Austrian beads and which were poorly imitated by the other countries; now, however, there is no longer the Austrian bead because the territory was formerly under the control of Austria and that made up the bead industry principally, is now under its own government, and is called Czechoslovakia."

"It is absolutely necessary that we import beads, because the industry can never meet with competition from this country. The processes are too slow and the labor too expensive here for us to try to make them. When you consider that children of six and even younger make the beads over there, it is explained. After the glass is moulded down to the size of the bead and the hole made, then these children manage the bead on a millstone, for almost every house over there has the water power running thru it and this they use in the making of their beads."

"It has been so long now since the really good beads have been used that this will undoubtedly mean that they will receive much attention this coming season. In Paris the house of Beer is making on some of its trico dresses, collars of beaded patterns. Perhaps the most noticeable thing in Paris is the use of the jet and crystal beads, and these used in all shapes and sizes."

"There will also be much of the tinsel embroidery employed, according to the dictates of Paris, and for this there is the dull gold and the gelatine or jet threads. The French blue is the color that is also much used in beads by the
