

Clay Court Tennis Championships On

Entries Said to Be Most Numerous Ever Made in Similar Contests.

Chicago, July 12.—Play began today in the ninth annual clay court tennis championship with what was said to be the largest list of entries in the history of American tennis.

Defaults were registered against R. Lindley Murray of Niagara Falls, N. Y., the national champion, and Ichiji Kumagae, Japanese star, now playing in the sectional championship at Cincinnati. They will be unable to appear, it was announced.

Eight rounds will be required because of the large entry list, and play will be continuous from morning until evening on the twenty-two courts of the south side tennis club through the championship play which will end on July 19.

Referee and Judge of Fight Disagree

Peccord Says Willard's Seconds Threw Sponge in Third; Barbour Says Fourth.

Toledo, July 12.—Disagreement between Oliver Peccord and W. Warren Barbour, referee and time keeper respectively of the Willard-Dempsey championship bout here July 4, became public today when Peccord announced he had today written a letter from Barbour in which Barbour declares the bout ended in the fourth round.

On the day following the bout Peccord announced in his official capacity that the affair ended in the third round as the towel was thrown into the ring before the bell sounded for resumption of hostilities in the fourth.

According to the Barbour letter the bell rang for the fourth round before the token of defeat appeared on the scene. Peccord said that in his reply to Barbour he will adhere to his original ruling on the ground that as the referee heard no bell and as neither boxer nor their handlers gave any indication of hearing it the fight technically stopped at the conclusion of the third round.

Referee Peccord is receiving letters from all over the country asking him for his opinion as to what round the fight terminated.
