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THUG TAKES \$200 CASH FROM SMITH
Local Man Backed Into Alley by Man With Gun and His Wealth Taken.
Lawrence Smith, residing at 223 Fourth avenue north, was held up early Tuesday morning between Third and Fourth avenues on Second street north by a highwayman and robbed of \$200. Smith was going home sometime after midnight and was confronted by the gunman as he arrived opposite Fourth alley, backing into the alley with his hands in the air and the highwayman's gun against his stomach to give up all the money he was carrying, as soon as they reached a place where the thug could operate in safety. The highwayman kept Smith covered with one hand while he went thru his pockets with the other and when the search was finished and the victim's cash transferred to his own he walked thru Gibson park towards the Great Northern railroad and was last seen following the tracks. He did not appear to be in any particular hurry to get away from the scene of the holdup. The description furnished the police by the victim is incomplete and the department doubts whether the identity of the highwayman can be established even if an arrest is made. In general build the thief resembled the highwayman who stopped two men last week on the north side, but it is not established that Monday night's job was done by the same man. No mask was worn by the highwayman, but the dark place chosen for the work prevented anything like a good description being obtained of his features.

HEAVY SHIPMENT OF LOCAL CATTLE
