



GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Chicago, July 18.—Severe setbacks in the price of corn resulted, today, from liquidation to which holders were largely prompted by financial and labor unrest.

NEW YORK MARKET

FINANCIAL. New York, July 18.—The final session of the week on the stock exchange, a recess having been ordered for tomorrow, was characterized by further erratic fluctuations of prices, traceable in part to an increase of short selling.

Revival of bearish aggression was accompanied by reports which hinted at approaching labor disturbances, but these were not confirmable in the highest and best-informed industrial quarters.

For the long account, further encouragement was given to the rally in exchange on London and Paris and the weekly mercantile reviews, which lost none of their recent optimistic tone.

Motor and the best known specialties, oils and equipments, embracing the various steel and iron specialties, hobcocks, leathers and sundry specialties, were conspicuous in the ebb and flow of the more moderate changes.

The stock list was at lowest levels just before noon, but rallied with such ease as to suggest a scarcity of the floating supply in some of the more popular stocks.

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NEAR 25,000,000 FEET OF TIMBER CUT IN WYOMING

Most of Past Year's Production Taken From Vast Medicine Bow Forest

Cheyenne, Wyo.—Nearly twenty-five million feet of lumber were taken out of the national forests in Wyoming during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1919.

Figures received by C. S. Hill, state commissioner of immigration, from the district forester at Denver showed that the total was 24,207,000; that the Medicine Bow forest took first place, with 10,180,000 feet cut, and that the Washakie reserve ran second with 7,679,000.

It is estimated that the standing timber in the national forests of Wyoming is now as follows: Ashley, 6,073,000 feet; Big Horn, 1,119,569,000; Black Hills, 341,300,000; Bridger, 605,000,000; Caribou, 3,180,000; Hayden, 508,490,000; Medicine Bow, 2,588,375,000; Shoshone, 1,355,742,000; Targhee, 548,949,000; Teton, 6,317,189,000; Washakie, 1,366,200,000; Wyoming, 1,433,726,000.

Following were amounts of timber cut under commercial sales during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1919: Big Horn, 399,000; Bridger, 90,000; Hayden, 308,000; Medicine Bow, 1,213,000; Shoshone, 401,000; Teton, 225,000; Washakie, 425,000; Wyoming, 511,000.
