CHARGE GREAT NORTHERN CASHIER WITH FORGERY
John R. Speck Arrested Upon Complaint of Railroad Special Agents Who Allege He Fraudulently Cashed Payroll Checks Amounting to About \$1000—Confederate Escapes.

John R. Speck, for the past three years, assistant cashier at the local Great Northern office, is a prisoner at the county jail and another employee of the same railroad is a fugitive as the result of the alleged discovery that during the past two months the men have secured between \$300 and \$1,000 by forging indorsements on paychecks drawn in favor of other employees. Speck was arrested by Sheriff J. P. Burns on complaint of M. J. Lins, chief special agent for the Great Northern, and R. Miller, head of the road's Great Falls detective force, both of whom have been working on the case for several weeks following the uncovering of alleged irregularities in Speck's cash account.

U. S. OFFICERS ARREST MORRIS
Austrian Held for Robbing Soldier May Be Deported Under Warrant.

Individuals may forget but Uncle Sam does not. He proved it Tuesday by sending an immigration officer to Great Falls to hold Dick Morris on a deportation charge. Baldwin, of the United States immigration department, wired Washington for a warrant to deport Morris to his home in Austria Tuesday afternoon.

Morris has been in trouble regularly for months. On several occasions he faced local courts on the charge of gambling and was convicted at least once.

But he roused the ire of Uncle Sam and many local citizens about two weeks ago by assisting Gladys Howard in robbing a discharged soldier, George Euroancieco, of \$150 in cash and a \$100 liberty bond.

Morris has been in this country for 17 years. But he was not the kind of man who assumes any of the duties of citizenship. He used his alien birth to keep from serving during the military emergency, as he had never applied for citizenship papers.

PAN PROGRAM IS PURE JOY
Eight Good Acts Please Local Audience at First Performance of Vaudeville.

A straight program of pure joy is the present Pantheas show.

Not one or two good numbers but eight extra good, peppery, stellar acts—all getting the glad hand for encores, makes this week's Pan show the best Great Falls people have seen for weeks.

SHOES \$30 BY END OF YEAR
McDonald Returns From Eastern Markets With Statement Europe Forcing Up Price.

Shoes will jump in price until an average pair will sell for as high as \$30 before the first of next year is the opinion of Mr. McDonald of the McDonald shoe company after an inspection trip to eastern selling and manufacturing centers.

Demand for American shoes by European buyers which has already driven up the price 100 per cent in the past three months will cause further increases until the retail price will range from \$20 to \$30 Mr. McDonald declares. While the local shoemaker was in the east an English buyer contracted for \$10,000,000 worth of high grade American shoes and it was reported that a German syndicate was formed with capital of \$300,000,000 for the purchase of American made shoes to sell in Germany. Hides and leather as well as kid skins are being purchased by foreign buyers also.

Another factor which will not only affect the price of shoes but may cause the lowering of the workmanship on American shoes, in the opinion of Mr. McDonald, is the extent of the emigration of Italians and other foreign born shoe workmen to Europe. It is going to be difficult to fill the places of these skilled workers with American help, Mr. McDonald believes. As Boston and other eastern ports Mr. McDonald saw long lines of emigrants waiting to have their passports stamped before leaving for their native lands.

Strikes and discontent in labor lines are prevalent thruout the east at present Mr. McDonald said.

In discussing shoe prices, Mr. McDonald declared that because of a large stock on hand his store and other local firms would be able to maintain present prices on standard shoes but that new stocks would be considerably higher than their present ones.

American high grade hides are selling as high as 50 cents a pound and eastern manufacturers predict that they will go to \$1 a pound, Mr. McDonald declared. The big shipments of western cattle to market at this time will not affect the price of hides he believes.

COLLEGE OFFICIALS ASSIST IN DROUTH
 How to obtain hay at reasonable rates for the small dairy farmer is the problem upon which the staff of the state college is concentrating according to W. L. Beers, who is in charge of the bureau of marketing at the Bozeman institution. Mr. Beers was a business visitor in Great Falls between trains Tuesday.

Officials of the college are intense-plan arranged by the local farm bureau and expect it to prove the best method of obtaining hay, Mr. Beers declared. An exhaustive survey of the hay conditions in northern Minnesota was made by J. F. Brauder, assistant to Mr. Beers who recommended the shipping of this hay into Montana.

Another phase of the drouth relief work now being carried on by college authorities is the clearing house for stockmen maintained at Billings jointly by the United States bureau of animal industry and the college authorities. After the middle of next week, J. B. Burns, government officer in charge of the bureau will turn the work over to Professor A. E. Arnett, who is now assisting him.
