GREAT FALLS MAN SEEKS RELIEF OF MINERALS BOARD

J. C. E. Barker and Partners Want \$4,922.79 Returned to Them by Government.

Special to The Daily Tribune. Butte, Aug. 10.—Before the minerals relief commission ended its session in Butte, J. C. E. Barker of Great Falls, filed a supplemental claim in the interests of his partners, designated as the T. C. Benbow claim, amounting to \$4,922.79.

Mr. Barker testified all these claims were worked, and he said the largest body of chrome ore in the United States was discovered. He said they exposed the vein at 8,000 feet, and that its width ran from three to seven feet of solid, black rich chrome ore.
