BOND ISSUE TO COME UP AGAIN

Mayor Newman Declares Failure to Enact Irrigation Bill Into Law Means Delay.

Both political parties will incorporate the \$25,000,000 irrigation bond issue in their state platform at the next convention. Mayor Louis Newman, one of the fathers of the unsuccessful bill authorizing such an issue, predicted upon his return from the legislative session Sunday evening.

If the legislative session were of sufficient length to feel the pressure which would be brot to bear upon the senate by farmers and farm organizations throughout the state the bill would have been enacted into a law at this session, Mayor Newman declared. The house passed the irrigation measure by a vote of 78 to 10 but the judiciary committee of the senate killed it.

HISTORICAL HOUSE OF TILES BECOMES PLAIN DRUG STORE

Unique Structure in Mexico City Centuries Old, Falls Prey to Commerce.

Mexico City, Aug. 1.—(Correspondent of The Associated Press.)—The conversion of the "House of Tiles" into a typical American drug store marks the passing of one of the most peculiar and unique structures ever erected in this city of interesting buildings. Many persons in the United States remember the house as the Jockey Club, the most exclusive and aristocratic place of its kind in the republic, but for the past few years it has stood on a prominent downtown corner, a bleak, decrepit structure, whose shiny and gaudy exterior of tile gave evidence of its former glory.

The family of Don de Rivero, who later became the Count of Orizaba, remained in possession of the house until the time of the ill-fated Emperor Maximilian. His last descendant was a sister of the then Count of Orizaba, upon whom the emperor conferred the title of Marquesa de Cira.

Later the structure was taken over by the Jockey Club and converted into a sumptuous club house. Stories of fabulous sums won and lost at its gaming tables persist to this day. Stirring revolutionary times caused its abandonment and for several years the building was vacant until the present lessees secured it for a period of twenty years.

WAITRESS LETS SLIP CLUE WHICH RESULTS IN ROBBER'S CAPTURE

Detectives Being Served Hear Pratter That Bags a Daring Criminal.

Chicago, Aug. 10.—As a waitress in the Morrison hotel coffee shop brought the double order of ham and eggs for two gentlemen at her station, she turned a marcelled head to a blonde colleague and observed: "Yes, that must have been Tina's fellow. He made her promise not to tell, you know. But didn't he give her \$50 for a new hat today?" "Tell what?" smiled one of the gentlemen, who were none other than Detective Sergeants McFarland and Carten of the detective bureau. "Why," confided the marcelled one, as her fingers closed over a \$1 bill, "Tina's fellow's a bank robber, you know. Hadn't you heard of the messenger of the An-

State bank being held up?" They had. That was July 28, the day after the robbery, which netted the robbers \$41,000 in cash and negotiable paper. The detectives learned that Tina lived at 3642 Prairie avenue. Her full name was Tina Prose. It was while working in a quick lunch restaurant at 27 West Madison street that she met Edward Tillian. Soon thereafter she quit work. Edward was a Latvian provider, but he was out of town a great deal. He used to send Tina telegrams regularly. "Yes," said Tina, "he told me it took 30 days to trail that messenger boy before they could pull off a successful job. 'Where is he now?' queried Messars. McFarland and Carten. 'Kansas City.' They hurried to Kansas City, arrested Tillian and brought him to Chicago. He has confessed to his participation in the robbery of the messenger, also of cashing forged checks for sums ranging from \$100 to \$500 at Milwaukee, Philadelphia, St. Louis and other towns. His total proceeds from checks is estimated at \$25,000. 'I'm going to stick by him,' said Tina. 'I love her,' said Mr. Tillian, who doesn't know the details of the circumstances leading up to his capture. He obtained a promise from the officers that they would not prosecute Tina before he confessed, the officers say.
