NEW YORK MARKET

FINANCIAL. New York, Aug. 13.—Trading on the stock exchange, today, was extremely superficial and again restricted to specialties, except from further activity in equipments, oils and allied shares, which have been the prominent features of recent sessions. While considerably in excess of yesterday's moderate turnover, the volume of business afforded a striking contrast to the long succession of days when operations averaged 1,500,000 shares, occasionally running well beyond that impressive total. The most reassuring feature of the session was the greater ease of money, but shading appreciably after midday on an over-abundance of offerings. Excepting Baldwin Locomotive, which materially augmented yesterday's substantial gain in the early hours on reports of recapitalization, only a few stocks reacted abruptly later, and American Telephone, where a further decline of 5 points accompanied adverse dividend rumors, there was little of an obvious character to furnish an incentive in either direction. Trading was most active and highly confusing in the final hour, when stocks of the same class moved contrarily, an irregular rally tone prevailing at the close. Sales amounted to 956,000 shares. United States Steel and affiliated companies also showed a record minimum quotations in the final period, the reaction among other leaders, including Crutcher, and Baldwin Locomotive, ranging from three to six points. CHICAGO MARKET

GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Chicago, Aug. 13.—Notable falling off in volume of dealings formed the principal feature of the corn market, today, and was generally ascribed to uncertainties attending the labor situation and the movement to curtail the cost of living. Price changes were narrower than usual. The close was unsettled, 3/4c net lower to 5/8c advance, with September \$1.91 1/2 to \$1.91 3/4, and December \$1.52 1/2 to \$1.52 3/4. Oats finished 1/2 to 1 1/2c up and provisions at declines of 2c to 4c. Most of the trade in corn was of a purely local character and in small lots. The public, as a rule, appeared to have withdrawn from the market and to be awaiting more definite developments of an industrial and economic character. Meanwhile, the September delivery had a moderate upward slant in price the greater part of the time, owing to the scantiness both of arrivals and of the available stock here. On the other hand, the new crop months, December and May, tended downward in value, as a consequence of reports that there had been widespread soaking rains. Shortage of supplies as compared with a year ago gave strength to oats. Corn—September \$1.91 1/2; December \$1.52 1/2. Oats—September 76 1/2; December 79.
