

### PISTOL MATCH WON BY PORTLAND MAN

Lieutenant of Overseas Force Makes 293 Out of Possible 300.

Caldwell, N. J., Aug. 20.—Lieut. L. S. Spooner of Portland, Ore., a member of the American expeditionary forces athletic team won the individual pistol match of the navy rifle range today, firing 60 shots at 25 yards and making a score of 293 of a possible 300. He recorded 90 at slow fire; 97 at 20 seconds rapid fire, and 98 at ten seconds rapid fire.

Lieut. S. M. Ontehinos of the Porto Rico infantry was second with a score of 290 and Captain M. O'Connor, United States infantry, third, with a score of 287.

The civilian individual pistol match, consisting of 60 shots at 25 yards, was won by A. P. Lane of the Worwalk, Conn. Rifle club, with a score of 287. He scored 98 at slow fire, 95 at 20 seconds rapid fire, and 94 at 10 seconds rapid fire. G. S. Hall of the California civilian team was third, also with a score of 286, but with a lower rapid fire average.

### Wisconsin Player Comes to the State College as Coach

Bozeman, Aug. 19.—Walter D. Powell of Reedsburg, Wis., famous football player at the university of Wisconsin, has accepted the position as director of athletics and physical education at the Montana state college. He will succeed Coach Fred Bennion who has been with the college for several years, and who resigned this spring to go to Oregon as county agricultural agent.

Mr. Powell played football at Wisconsin in 1912. He took part in nearly all the other sports of his life.

Since leaving Wisconsin he has been athletic director and head coach at Western Reserve University in Ohio; and for the last two years on leave of absence in the service of the United States as camp athletic director at Camp Sherman, and later as athletic director for the sixth naval district with headquarters at Charleston, S. C.

He gave up the latter task in June of this year. Three weeks ago he visited the state college and met the authorities who offered him the place which he has just accepted.

He expects to be in Bozeman by September 1.
