### Fire Fighters Steal Ham and Lose Wages in Making Settlement

Kalspell, Aug. 20.—Because they stole the only ham at a camp forest fire fighters, at which they had been employed, leaving the other members of the crew without meat for a whole day, two employees of the Northern Montana Forestry association were compelled to leave with the court here \$48, the bulk of the money they had earned on the fire lines. This record in ham prices was set after A. E. Boorman, secretary of the association swore out a warrant for the arrest of Jack Williams and C. F. Linderman, charging them with the theft of the ham from the association. The men had been employed as fire fighters, and upon leaving took the ham with them, Mr. Boorman charged. Upon arrest officers found the meat among Williams' belongings. When he was arraigned he entered a plea of guilty. Linderman admitted he knew of the theft but said he thought Williams was taking it as a joke. The court announced that he considered it a poor joke on those men in the camp who had a meatless day forced upon them. He therefore fined each of the men \$20, and ordered them to pay \$5 for the ham. Their joint pay checks amounted to \$48, so they had enough to square their obligation to the court with \$3 left over.

### James Larkin Named Butte Chief Detective

Butte, Aug. 20.—On recommendation of Mayor Stodden, Chief of Police J. J. Murphy is authorized to appoint James Larkin as chief of detectives for Butte to succeed Edward Morrissey, who was removed recently from the force following a trial held before the police commission on the ground that because of his alleged indulgence in liquor and unbecoming conduct he was not fitted to remain a police officer. Larkin has been a city detective for a number of years, and has a long record for running down criminals.

### Butte Grads Organize to Boost University

Butte, Aug. 20.—A banquet at the Thornton hotel in Butte last night resulted in graduates and former students to the number of 50 forming an organization known as the "Greater University of Montana club of Butte" for the purpose of promoting the interests of Montana schools and to establish a fraternal spirit among former students and graduates. The meeting was conducted by Miss Patricia O'Flynn of Butte, graduate of the state university. President C. H. Clapp of the school of mines was one of the principal speakers. Officers for the coming year include: Miss Patricia O'Flynn, president; Leo Stalman, secretary; Miss Alice O'Brien, treasurer. Miss May Lortz, Miss Helen Tripp, Miss Gladys Huffman and John Morton constitute the executive committee. Clarence Hanley, chairman; Lester Cole and I. O. Proctor compose a committee to draft the constitution and by-laws.

### Malta Rancher Dies Despite an Operation

### Hail Insurance Levy to Be Fixed Saturday

Helena, Aug. 20.—Size of the state levy on insured grain fields to pay the crop fixed arising from hail storms will be fixed at a meeting of the state board of hail insurance which has been summoned by Chairman E. K. Bowman to meet at the capitol Saturday. More than \$0,000 acres of grain were insured under the state plan, Mr. Bowman says, and the levy will be made on these. It will be sufficient only to cover actual hail losses and the administrative costs of handling the insurance.

### Dry Winds Injure Gallatin Pastures and Late Hay Crops

Special to The Daily Tribune. Bozeman, Aug. 20.—Gallatin county had no rain during the past week and in consequence the hot, dry winds were very hard on pastures and second crops of hay. Threshing is progressing where grain was worth cutting, dry land crops yielding from six to 10 bushels to the acre. Twenty-six bushels to the acre is reported as the yield from one irrigated wheat field.

### Aid for Greek Orphans Will Be Extended by American Red Cross

Saloniki, Aug. 20.—The American Red Cross has sent a commission to visit a number of Greek orphanages with a view to helping them. The commission already has inspected the institutions at Saloniki, Cavalla, Seres, Drama and Pravdita, where there are housed many orphans whose parents were killed or died during the Bulgarian invasion of Macedonia.

### GERMAN CIVILIANS ATTACKING TROOPS

#### However, Faction Opposing Noske's Forces Appears in Small Minority.

Coblentz, Aug. 9.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Thruout Germany there has been a renewal recently of clashes between troops of Gustav Noske, secretary for military affairs, and civilians, but just what has caused the disturbances is not clear in dispatches published in German newspapers. American army officers, however, believe it quite possible that the manifestations are due to the food shortage, the relocation of Noske's troops and the subsequent appearance of strange troops in many cities.

In Celle, Hanover, there has been trouble for more than a week, at times the manifestations amounting almost to riots over the appearance of a Jaeger battalion which arrived recently from the eastern front. The citizens contended that this battalion had eaten too much of the city's food supply, a Heilbronn, Wuerttemberg, individual soldiers have been attacked and beaten by civilians at night and their insignia stolen. Disturbances between Interburg, West Prussia, citizens and soldiers of the First Jaeger zu Pferde regiment, has reached such a state that the civil authorities have made demands upon the government that the troops be moved to another district.

From information in the hands of the officers at headquarters of the American forces in Germany it is believed that, while the majority of the German people are now loyally supporting the government troops, there is an energetic minority which has been increasing in bitterness recently against the Noske troops wherever they have appeared in various parts of Germany.

### State Board Approves Assessment in Toole
