## Whitefish to Have Many New Walks and Curbs of Concrete

Whitefish, Aug. 21.—The city council at its regular meeting Monday night passed the final resolution for creation of a special improvement district involving the construction of concrete sidewalks on both sides of Kalispell and Spokane avenues from Second street to Fifth street and on Third and Fourth streets between Central avenue and the alley between Kalispell and Columbia avenues. The district also calls for the construction of concrete curbs and street and alley crossings, as well as the building of parking strips and the grading of the streets. Altogether, the improvements involve the expenditure of about \$20,000, to be paid in five annual installments. Bids will be called for at once, and the work commenced as soon as possible in the endeavor to complete it before winter.

## Cleaning Up Havre Alleys and Yards to Prevent Fires

## DESPITE SHORTAGE IN YIELD WHEAT IS OF EXCELLENT GRADE

### Average Crops in State Run Below Five Bushels—Little Progress in Late Crops.

Helena, Aug. 21.—Threshing operations are reported in each of the 11 counties covered in the crop report for the week ending August 16, issued today by Charles D. Greenfield, commissioner of agriculture and publicity. The yield is light but the quality good. In several counties the third cutting of alfalfa is being made with a fair yield. Hains in the northeastern section have helped the ranges and as a result shipments of livestock to market are in better posture outside the state are not so heavy as a month ago. The following are the reports from the different counties:

Riichland—Threshing has begun. Yields in many cases better than expected, owing to late showers which helped filling. Some third cutting alfalfa being made. Early corn is very promising and will reach full maturity within two weeks.

Prairie—Threshing about half over, with reported yields averaging about 13 bushels. Oats crop is total failure, none being threshed. Range conditions not improved. Corn crop almost a failure.

Stillwater—Dryland wheat all threshed. Good quality but low yields. There will be a surplus of fall wheat above seeding needs. Third cutting alfalfa going on in some places with a fair yield. Sugar beets and beans doing well where a stand was secured. Local showers helped range in some places.

Broadwater—Weather conditions have been more favorable with a good shower early part of the week. Lewis and Clark—Wheat still being threshed; yields averaging about four bushels. Irrigated alfalfa cutting is good.

Cascade—Threshing pretty well along. Some seeding fall wheat in the dry soil. Much stock being shipped to outside points for pasture.

Fergus—Harvest practically completed this week, and farmers are threshing. Present indications are that there will be ample seed wheat for the county's needs with a small surplus of spring wheat in mountain regions.

Teton—Crop conditions in this county practically unchanged since last week's report.

Tooie—Farmers shipping out their stock to pasture. Recent rain helped the grass somewhat, but continued dry weather since is burning it up again.

Valley—Harvest is well under way and will be finished in another week, but little threshing has been done. Rye is averaging three bushels, wheat about the same or a little less, and no oats or barley will be harvested. Stock still looking good, but very little will be shipped out for a month or six weeks.

Sanders—Grain is turning out better than expected.

## Havre Sweltering Beneath Smoke Cloud

## PEOPLE OF SCOBEEY TO AGAIN BRING UP NEW COUNTY PLAN

### Plan Circulation of Daniels County Petitions Next Month. Roosevelt Simmering.

Butte, Aug. 21.—Visitors in Butte from Sheridan county aver that there are signs of some interesting developments in the matter of county division in that corner of the state. It is stated that early in the month of September people living in that section surrounding Scobey will begin circulating petitions with the hopes of creating the county of Daniels from the northwest corner of Sheridan county. It is also expected that included in this new county will be a strip of Valley county, in the extreme northeast corner. If the petitioners are successful in setting aside this new county there seems to be no doubt but what Scobey will be the county seat, as there are no towns in that region that will oppose.

This new county will extend east along the Plentywood branch of the Great Northern far enough to include the town of Navajo. This will also include Flaxville and Madoc on that branch, and will also include the town of Whitetail, the terminus of the Soo Line branch, which town is situated 15 miles northwest of Scobey. The proposed county will extend south through the Fort Peck reservation to the north boundary line of Roosevelt county, which county was carved from the south end of old Valley county by an act of the last regular session of the legislature.

Those towns in that portion of Valley county which are to be included in the proposed county of Daniels will not be included in that section of the county seat from the fact that none of them are situated on a railroad. Neither it is said is there any opposition to the petitions for the county seat, and a majority of people in that section predict that the new county will be possible just as soon as the legal formalities can be completed.

Roosevelt county is not through as yet with its difficulties of establishing a permanent county seat. The temporary county seat is at Mondak, where it was expected to remain until the next general election is held, when it has been expected, Culbertson, Poplar, Bainville and Wolf Point would attempt to secure the county capital. The town of Froid in the northeast corner of Roosevelt shows signs, however, of hurrying matters, and is already petitioning the county commissioners to let the matter be settled at a special election to be held in September.

## BOZEMAN AVIATOR TO PILOT SEAPLANE OVER THE PACIFIC

### Lieut. Finlay Will Drive Monster Airship on Trans-Pacific Flight.

Special to The Daily Tribune. Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 21.—Lieut. William P. Finlay, of Bozeman, Mont., has been selected to pilot the world's largest and only triple-motored monoplane which is being built at the factory of the George D. White company, 107 East Forty-ninth street, at a cost of more than \$50,000.

Lieut. Finlay formerly was bombing instructor at Ellington Field, Texas, and for two years bombing pilot with the United States air service. He saw active service in Europe with the American expeditionary forces. He is widely known in Montana. The machine which Lieut. Finlay will pilot on its trans-Pacific dash and later on a flight from Los Angeles, is of the seaplane type, having two pontoon floats and an unsinkable body.

The flight will be made via San Francisco, Victoria, B. C., Sitka, Alaska, Unalaska and Shanghai, and it is expected to be made in three days. The big machine has a number of unique features which its inventor, George D. White claims will make it the peer of any aircraft in the world. White helped design the famous "S" type, Martin seaplane, pronounced the best naval aircraft extant.

## Sparks Start a Fire Destroying Grain and Grain Separator

Special to The Daily Tribune. Havre, Aug. 21.—Sparks from the engine of a threshing outfit caused a \$2,000 loss at the farm of M. Faurte, near Cottonwood, in Hill county, Wednesday. The threshing outfit was owned by Jacoby & Son. The bottoms of two stacks of rye was burned, causing an additional loss of \$150 worth of grain, settlement for which was immediately made by the owners of the threshing outfit. The separator was almost entirely destroyed by the flames which spread rapidly.
