CALGARY INQUIRES ABOUT DANDELIONS

Alberta Tourists Attracted by Beauty of Local Lawns Plan to Follow Suit. Calgary plans to follow the lead of Great Falls and keep the dandelion out of private and public lawns beginning next year. This decision is the direct result of a visit to Great Falls by prominent Canadians during the present summer. Information as to the methods followed in the local campaign of extermination is sought by R. J. Lyditt, president of the Calgary board of trade, in a letter received by R. S. Skinner, secretary of the local commercial club. President Lyditt declares that the beauty of Great Falls lawns and their lack of dandelions attracted J. W. Davidson, president of the Calgary Rotary club and other tourists who visited in Great Falls this summer. The tourists upon their return to Alberta informed officers of civic societies of the success of the local campaign during which a quarter million of the weeds were picked from private and public lawns in a competitive campaign in which school children participated. Official information from the board of trade followed.

EPIDEMIC CLOSES MONTANA NORMAL

What Was Thought to Be the Flu Is Jaundice Local Students Report. Local young women who have been attending the summer session of the state normal college at Dillon returned to their homes in Great Falls Saturday and Sunday afternoon because of an epidemic which broke out at Dillon a few weeks ago. The epidemic was at first thought to be a renewal of the Spanish influenza which swept the country last winter but as it became more prevalent it was found to be a mild form of the yellow jaundice, caused from intestinal trouble probably due to contaminated water and food. The normal college was dismissed two weeks earlier than the summer schedule requires owing to the large number of students attending its session who became ill with this disease. There are several scores of cases of the malady in the city at the present time. The victim complains of general sickness, accompanied by a low fever and the eyes and skin turn yellow.
