Helena, Aug. 30.—With the arrival of the advance guard of the race horse contingent, the Montana state fair grounds begins to assume the aspect of a revival of the "days of real sport." Trainers, jockeys and exercise boys are grooming the bangtails, putting them in shape to face the barrier before Starter Jim Haley, Monday, Sept. 8.

The Cooney, Howard and Kinsman, Hogan, Tonkin and Bartlett stables are already on the ground with some promising looking speedsters, among them several colts of Montana breeding which will be entered in the maiden classes.

Brownie Nelson Present.
George Cooney has Jack Ellis, Laylow and Anxious Moments under training and all are rounding into form for the opening, under daily workouts by Joe Charbeneau, Brownie Nelson, former premier of Montana jockeys, is here in charge of some of Dave Hogan's youngsters, which will be heard from in the colt events.

Howard and Kinsman have Rosie Rogan, Firo, both 3-year-olds, and Virron, a 2-year-old. J. Tonkin of Butte is working Tonkinson and Lady Tonkin and the Bartlett stable includes Penora and Vivian H.

Steve Adams of Chinook will be here with Billy Finn and Queen Ruth, together with a relay string to compete for the money in the speed events, as well as the men's relay.

The veteran trainer, Bill Singleton, has sent word to local horsemen that he expects to clean up with Robert Mantell and Harry D., both of which took down big purses at Cheyenne in the meet just closed.

Keen competition is assured in the relay races with the famous Irwin brothers, Parsons, Steve Adams and George Drumheller string entered to make it a four-cornered contest for the big prizes hung up for these thrilling events.

In addition to the daily running races and relay card the speed program will include four days of pony express races.

Many Injured in Ball Game Melee

Atlanta Ball Fans Jubilant Over Victory Throw Missiles Into Crowd.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 30.—More than a score of spectators were injured, some severely, in a demonstration following today's double header baseball game between Atlanta and New Orleans, the leading clubs in the southern association.

A crowd estimated at more than 12,000 had jammed the stands and surrounded the field to see the two games the last of the season here. When the final out of the second game was made, the crowd rushed for the exits, throwing pop bottles, cushions and even chairs. Some of the spectators were hit by the articles thrown and others were injured in the jam.

By breaking even, today, Atlanta made it two out of three in the series and tomorrow starts a road trip four and a half games ahead of New Orleans.

"How far is it to the north pole?" E. C. Abbott, popularly known as Teddy Blue, of Lewistown, begged a newspaperman to tell him Saturday evening, upon his return from Calgary, where he attended the stampede.

"It seems as though the farther north I go the better time I have," Teddy Blue declared, as he related his experiences at the Alberta roundup. "So the next time I'm going right on north until I come to the top."

Charles Russell's pictures were one of the features of the big stampede, the Lewistown rancher said, as he praised the big roundup. A number of Russell's views were on display at the fair grounds in a specially constructed gallery with special lighting effects. It required three members of the northwestern mounted police to handle the crowds seeking admittance to the display. Russell will take his pictures to Saskatoon for display at a big celebration in honor of the visit of the Prince of Wales.

All champions fell before the ring of the outlaws at the stampede, according to Teddy Blue. Riders were thrown like tenderloin on an old time cattle ranch and the only rider winning renown was a northern Montana youth named Williamson, who stuck on the backs of steers each day of the stampede.

"Gavvy" Cravath Leads National

Manager of Phillies Has .340 Batting Average; Ty Cobb Safe in American.

Chicago, Aug. 30.—Ed. Rousch, one of the batting stars in Cincinnati's pennant drive, is flirting with the batting championship of the National league.

Unofficial averages released today show he tied Jim Thorpe of Boston for second place with an average of .326 with "Gavvy" Cravath, manager of the Philadelphia club, topping the league hitters with .340.

Cutshaw of Pittsburgh continues to lead the base stealers with 21, with Bigbee, a teammate, and Jack Smith of St. Louis tied for second with 25.

With the close of the season a month away, Ty Cobb is in no apparent danger of being dethroned as the champion batter of the American league. The Detroit star is safely in the lead with an average of .380. Coach Cobb's teammate, is in second place with .356.

"Babe" Ruth, the sensational slugger with Boston, who is striving to break the major league home run record of 25 established by Buck Freeman of the Washington National league in 1899, has shattered the American league record with 23, bagging four in his last six games. Ruth also has scored a total of 80 runs in 105 games.

Eddie Collins, the Chicago second baseman, is pressing George Sisler of St. Louis for honors in base stealing. Sisler with 26 having a margin of two.

Production of Klein Coal Mine Exceeds 3000 Tons in One Day

Roundup, Aug. 30.—For the first time in the history of the mine, the big Republic coal mine at Klein has passed the 3,000-ton mark for one day's production, the tally reaching 3,070 tons, in an eight-hour shift. When it is considered that in order to do this three to four cars must be hoisted a distance of nearly 400 feet every minute, the magnitude of the feat can be seen. It is said that this has not been duplicated by any shaft mine west of the Mississippi river. The No. 4 mine, one mile east of the city, has been reopened by the same company with a force of 80 men and a production at the start of 200 tons daily. Within a couple of months between 300 and 400 men will be employed and production will reach the 1,000-ton mark.

Baseball About Dead for Season

No Games Scheduled Today and No Prospects of Any Appear for 1919.

There will be no baseball in Great Falls this Sunday, nor perhaps for the remainder of the season. It is understood the Smelter Ingots have been disbanded and Sammie Newman's Independents, although greatly strengthened, find no opponents this late in the season, and may not play again during 1919.

It was hoped several weeks ago that the strong Cut Bank team, defeated by the Wolf Point Wolves last week for the state championship, would be brought to Earling park for a game with the Ingots on Labor day. However, at that time both the Cut Bank and Smelter nines were looked upon as probable state champions, both still having the right to battle for the title. The game was to have been a return contest for the one played by the Ingots at Cut Bank, this having been called in the fifth inning because of rain with the score 5 to 3 in favor of the Cut Bank aggregation.

Great Falls did not support its ball teams very liberally this season, the crowds, with the exception of one or two contests, being small ones, sometimes but a mere handful of rooters who attended for the sake of the sport rather than the quality of baseball they expected to see.

The city could have had a remarkably strong nine had the best players on both teams united into one aggregation. Fans who understand the situation believe this is why baseball fell down here during the past summer.

However, they hold out hopes for some great sport next season, indications of Great Falls entering a team in a proposed circuit with Butte, Spokane and a Canadian city or two being bright.

Only Americans Play for Title

Championship Tennis Honor Now Go to One of Four Yankees.

Forest Hills, N. Y., Aug. 30.—All danger of the 1919 national tennis singles championship going abroad was removed today with elimination of the last of the foreign competitors in the 35th championship tournament of the national tennis association.

The completion of the fifth round found three eastern and one western raquet expert still in the running. The new title holder will be evolved from among William M. Johnston of San Francisco, Wallace F. Johnson, William T. Tilden, 2nd, both of Philadelphia, and R. Norris Williams of Boston. Of this quartet, two are previous holders of national titles. Williams won in 1914 and 1916. Johnston was crowned champion in the 1915 tournament.
